New Method of Keeping Potatoes.

The United States Consul-General
at Frankford, Mr. Richard Gueuther,
reports that a German publication,
the "Practical Advisor in Fruit Rais-
ing and Gardening," states that a
new method for keeping potatoes
and preventing sprouting consists of
placing them on a layer of coke. Dr.
Schiller, of Brunswick, who has pub-
lished the method, is of the opinion
that the improved ventilation by
means of coke is not alone respon-
sible for the result, but believes that
it is due to the oxidation of the coke,
which, however, is a very slow one.
Coke always contains sulphur, and
it is very possible that the minute
quantities of oxides of carbon and
sulphur which result from the oxida-
tion mixing with the air and pene-
trating among the potatoes are suffi-
cient to greatly retard sprouting.
Potatoes so treated are said to keep
in good condition until the follow-
ing July.
