Our Energetic Representative.

During the time Mr Carvell has been the representative of this county at Ottawa, on no occasion has he overlooked the needs of his constituency. Every matter whether of greater or minor importance has received his prompt attention. Even his bitter political opponents readily admit this. All know the strenuous nature of the fight he made to get the Grand Trunk down the Valley, and it was only when the report of Engineers showed the necessity of going through the centre of the Province that Mr Carvell reluctantly dropped the fight. Now we have another evidence of his interest and ability to get what he asks for in the region of possibility. It is only a few days ago that the President of the Board of Trade, Mr J T Allen Dibble took up the matter of the Annual Drill for the 67th Regt, 10th Field Battery and the Engineers, being held in Woodstock. Mr Carvell at once took up the matter with the Minister of Militia and the Adjutant General with the result that Mr Dibble has received the following letter from Mr Carvell.

Ottawa, May 17th, 1909
J T ALLEN DIBBLE, Esq
Woodstock.

DEAR SIR,—
I have just had an interview with Sir Frederick Borden and the Adjutant General. They have authorized me to say to you that the 67th Regt 10th Field Battery and the Engineers will perform their annual drill at Woodstock. The date will probably be the last week in June.

This will mean the spending of a large amount of money in the Town of Woodstock as well as making the town a centre of activity for the period during which the drill is carried on.

There is no doubt that the securing of this drill, which we trust will only be the beginning, is due to the promptness and influence of Mr Carvell. It again illustrates the worth of having the right man at Ottawa.

C P R Summer Time Table.

According to the Summer Time Table of the C P R trains will leave Queen St as follows: Morning train for McAdam 7.10, Express from McAdam for Edmundston 11.52 a m, Down Express for McAdam 5.45 p m, and the night train will arrive from McAdam at 10.10. The Gibson train will leave at 5 p m. On Monday and Saturday will run as Express. On Saturday Gibson train will arrive in Fredericton at 7.45 pm. Other days the Gibson will arrive at Fredericton 9.00 pm and returning leave Fredericton 7.40 arriving in Woodstock at 12.22

The Public Holiday.

The Woodstock Band is working hard to make the meet on May 24th a success. It is going to be a big day in the town and many from the country will take advantage of the sports and attend.

The Spoils System

Conservative papers are displaying hysterical symptoms over the dismissal of a Conservative postmaster in Manitoba on a charge of offensive partisanship preferred by Hon Clifford Sifton.

"A flagrant outrage" one of Mr Hazen's organs calls it.

What blatant hypocrisy! We do not defend the spoils system, even in the limited extent of its practice by the Laurier government. An official whose record is clean should not be dismissed on the mere accusation of a member of parliament. Active participation in politics is forbidden to employees of the government and violation of this order is quite properly punishable by dismissal. But ordinary fair play demands that a man so accused should be given opportunity for self-defense.

But it does not lie in the mouth of any supporter of Mr Hazen to find fault with federal dismissals of Conservative office holders for any reason and to any extent. At least the federal government makes no pretense of being non-partisan. The complaint of the average New Brunswicker against Mr Hazen is not so much that he is working the spoils system extravagantly and violently to the advantage of his greedy heelers, but that in so doing he is viciously violating the pledges upon which he attained office. He won his election as the professed leader of a coalition party. He openly admitted his indebtedness to Liberal voters who had supported him on non-party lines. But no sooner was he in the saddle than he began a merciless campaign against Liberal office holders all over the province. Hundreds of heads have fallen; hundreds of new appointments have been made and in practically every instance of change it has been a Liberal who has suffered and a Conservative who has profited.

The spoils system, openly and frankly used, is bad enough. It cannot be justified on broad public grounds. But the spoils system as practiced, under a cloak of lying pretense by a professedly non-partisan government in this province is vicious and abominable.—Sun.
