PLANS SHOW FINE NEW COURT HOUSE FOR WOODSTOCK

Work to Be Begun About June 1; Building Ready by New Year.

The municipal council of Carleton county are calling for tenders for a new court house, to be erected in Woodstock. This new building will be welcomed by all who have any legal business in Carleton county as many conveniences have been complained of by those attending in the present court house, which is more than two miles away from the town.

The new court house will be erected on Maine street, on the lot of land next to the record office. The new building will be connected with the record office and will carry out the same style of architecture. It will be a two story building and will have a frontage of eighty-three feet and will have a depth of ninety-eight feet. It will be entered through an arched sand stone entrance of the record office. To the right and left of the entrance hall will be large offices and a petit jury room.

The court room will be a large spacious chamber situated at the end of the hall. It will be about fifty-two feet square and will have a twenty-four foot high ceiling, finished at the juncture of the walls with a heavy ornamental plaster cove. The ceiling will be paneled off with matched beams. The walls will be broken into panels by large plaster pilasters finished with ornamental plaster capital. To a height of five and a half feet the walls will be paneled in birch stained and finished in imitation of mahogany; above the plaster will be painted in oil colors and decorated. At the rear of the court room will be judges, barristers, stenographers, a library and toilet rooms.

Overlooking the court room will be a large gallery to accommodate 200 people and which will be entered from the hall on the second floor. The rest of the second floor will be taken up by the offices.

The building will be of pressed brick, with sand stone trimmings. The base from grade to waterable will be of rock-face granite. The roof will be of slate. The interior fittings will be brick stained in imitation of mahogany. It will be lighted with electricity, heated with hot water and fitted with all modern conveniences.

The building committee having in charge the new building is composed of Henry Phillips, chairman; Mr McGill, Warden Shaw, Mr Hall and H. D. Stevens. It is the intention to start the work about June 1st, and have the building ready for occupancy for the new year. F. Neil Brodie, of St. John is the architect.

Britain's Naval Power.

In a letter to the Dundee Liberal party on the recent naval alarm Mr Churchill quotes figures to show that, whether in ships, men, or guns, Britain's superiority over Germany is overwhelming, being nearer three times as strong as any other naval power. Nor would the position be altered in 1912 and the years to follow. The Admiralty were prepared to prove that the British fleet was now, and would be in 1912, effectively superior, not only to any reasonable probable combination of two Powers, but to two of the next strongest Powers in Europe regardless of probability of their combination.

In view of the tremendous margin of safety the cries of sheer cowardice with which their air is filled contributed more to the gaiety of other nations than to the dignity of our own. He characterized as a monstrous error statements that there is a profound and natural antagonism between the British and German nations, and that the tides of destiny are irresistibly bearing us to a supreme trial of strength, no more fatal obsession could benumb the brain of a statesman. There is rivalry in commerce, no doubt, continues Mr Churchill, but there is also a substantial and growing independence. No Continental nation is commercially more necessary to us than Germany. She is our best foreign customer, and we are hers. If antagonism ever did come it would be created by the vicious activity of a comparatively small number of individuals in both countries and the culpable credulity of the largest classes.—Scottish American.

The Spirit of the Time.

In the midst of feverish commercial and business activity, of aggressive industrial movement, and intense political excitement, there are many signs of increased interest the world over in religious study and experience. On the doctrinal side there are conflicts among widely divergent schools, but these largely grow out of a more earnest search for truth, and a deeper and more general concern with the Christian faith, its basis and its consequences. There was never so much study of the Scriptures from all points of view, never so much research into the beginning of affairs, never so much desire to prove all things. Discussion goes on, but there is perhaps less dispute, certainly less of soiling at beliefs that men hold sacred, whether it be the sneer of the infidel at Christians, or of Protestant and Roman Catholic at each other, or of Christian people at the various forms of what they indiscriminately regarded as idolatries. While some fear that the Scriptures will be undermined by the too critical discussion of their origin and date, it has come about that certain teachers most under censure are among the most earnest and devout worshippers and the most humble and trusting Christians, and it has become possible for a church leader to join heartily in religious service with a brother whom he is trying to remove from the position of teacher of controversial doctrinal subjects.

The conflict of opinion over Genesis fills a large space in the press, but a much smaller place in the real activities of the Church. The preaching of the Word goes on as if there were only one opinion on these critical questions. If no question of these eleven chapters had arisen, they would not have formed a large part of the teaching and preaching of the Church, or of the devotional readings of the saints. At least it is true that while there is a certain conflict of opinion, and while some are troubled over it, it has not greatly interfered with the spiritual life of the devout, or the Christian experiences or believers.

On the other hand we notice such aggressive and determined campaigns as the laymen's missionary movement, which is simply and suddenly doubling the resources of men and money available for the spread of the Gospel. It is mainly an enlistment of business men and their methods into the missionary enterprise, having the double effect of giving the mission workers a greater human power behind them, and of enlisting in aggressive Gospel work a body of men who would otherwise be more absorbed in the race for wealth which is not always an elevating or wholesome pursuit. Also it is evident that the day of evangelists and of revivals is not past. The great Welsh revival of a few years ago, swept far beyond the bounds of that Principality. The sermons of an eminent Roman Catholic prelate recently shook the fashionable world of London. The Salvation Army is recognized as a mighty religious power, as well as a wonderful philanthropic institution. The services of Dr Torrey and Mr Alexander have been marked by the same results as those of Moody and Sankey in earlier years.

Today in Canada we take up the Toronto papers to find columns and almost pages given to the meetings of Gypsy Smith, the famous evangelist, whose meetings are more crowded than any amusement attraction presented in that city. The chief organ at Regina of one of the political parties, has for weeks given fuller reports of the meetings of Evangelist Gale than of any other proceedings, and day after day the religious revival in the capital of Saskatchewan was the subject of its leading editorials.

It is not just or wise, therefore, to speak of the present time as wholly or especially given over to the pursuit of material gain, or of low pleasures, or even of intellectual achievement. These things are in the life of the so-called Christian world, but they are not the whole of it, and perhaps not so much of it as they may have been at other times. St. John Standard.
