





matter of the St John Valley Railway beg leave to report that we attended to that duty and met at Fredericton with a number of delegates from St John and all the counties interested to speak before the government, viz : Mr Foster, St John; Mayor Chestnut, Fredericton; S L Peters, Queens County; B F Smith, Florenceville. The delegates asked the government to guarantee the bonds to the amount of \$25.000 a mile The Premier replied and promised the delegates that the government would grant

the request if delegates would be sent to Ottawa, who would ask the Dominion Gov't to take over the line when completed on the 40 per cent and 60 per cent basis; that is if they would pay the local government 40 per cent to pay interest on the bonds and retain 60 per cent for running expenses etc. There were also a number of gentlemen appointed to
