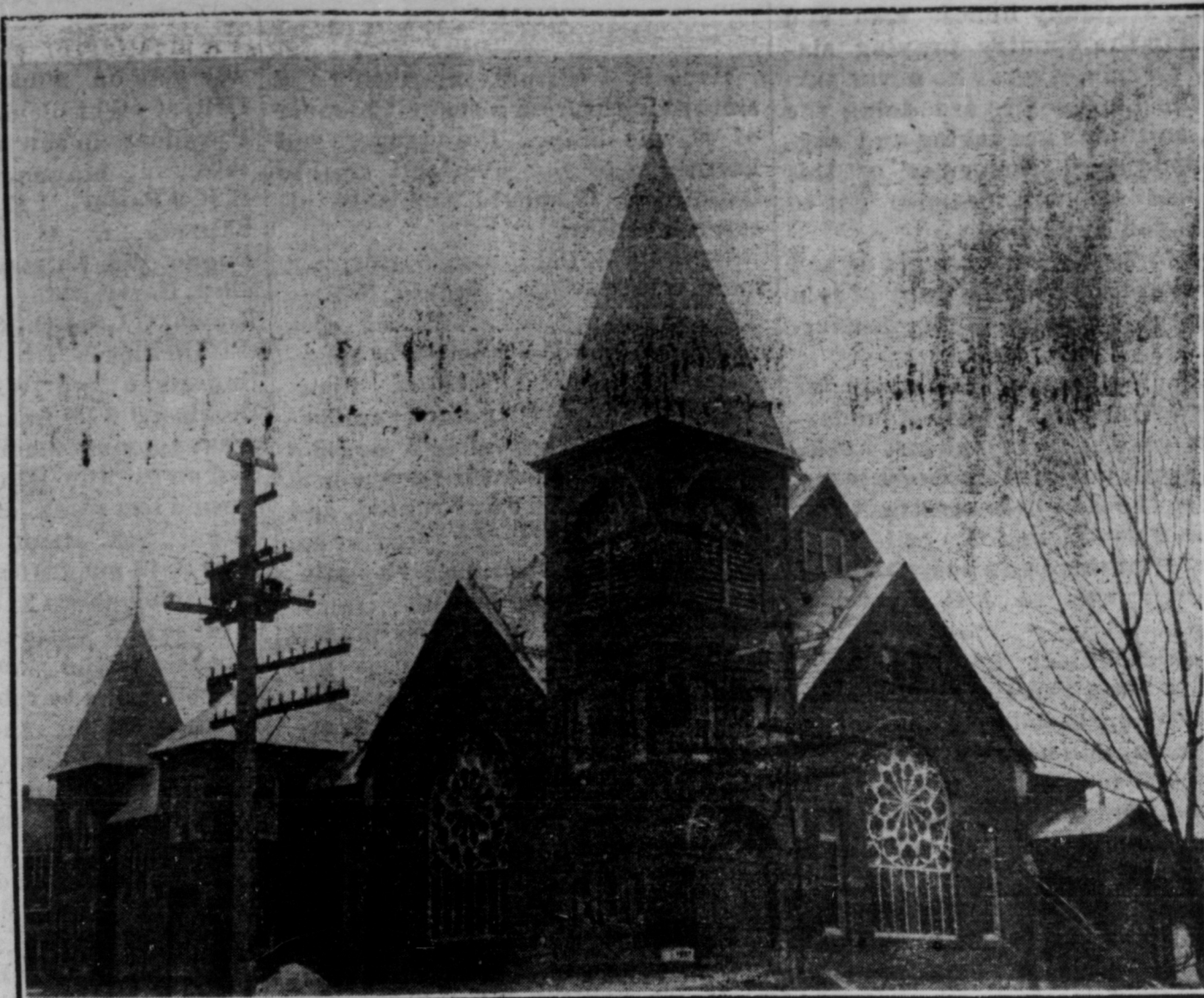

## THE METHODIST CONFERENCE.

The 26th Annual session of the N B & P E I Conference of the Methodist Church opened in the Woodstock Church this week. The ministerial session of the Conference opened Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock with ex President James Crisp in the chair. The usual questions regarding the ministers and probationers of the Conference were put and satisfactorily answered. The President, Rev S Howard, occupied the chair at the opening of the afternoon session. Rev G M Campbell D D was granted leave of absence to continue in Bible Society work and Rev A Lucas to engage in Sunday School work. Rev G M Young was transferred from the N B & P E I Conference to that of Nova Scotia and Rev R W Weddall, Rev Ernest Pugh and Rev

J J Durrant with the Conference.

The full Conference composed of ministers and laymen opened Wednesday morning at 9 o'clock. The Rev A D McCully was elected President and Rev M R Knight Secretary with Rev D R Chown Journal Secretary. The roll call showed about 100 members present.

The Stationing Committee laid the first draft of their report upon the table. The important changes are Rev S Howard from Exmouth St, St John to St Stephen, Rev R W Weddall to Woodstock, Rev W W Lodge to Exmouth St, St John, Rev G A Ross to Fairville, Rev Thos Deinstad to Shediac, Rev Harry Harrison to Derby, Rev E Ramsey to Richmond and Rev H C Rice to Hampton. Rev R G Fulton is transferred to British Columbia.

At the evening session Wednesday, Rev E Styles spoke on the Sunday School work and Rev Neil J McLaughlan on Epworth League.

Thursday morning was devoted to routine business and the evening session was devoted to educational work with addresses by Dr Allison, Prof Watson and Principal Palmer.

Friday evening the anniversary of the missionary society will be observed with addresses by Rev James Allen of Toronto and J N Harvey of St John. The ordination service will be Sunday morning, the preacher being Rev N S Magee. The preacher at the evening service will be Rev T Albert Moore, Secretary of the General Conference.

### COUNTY COUNCIL.

Upper Woodstock, June 15th.

County Council met at 10 a m. The following councillors were present: Aberdeen—D H Lamont, E S Gilmore. Brighton—C J Connolly, Allen Bradley.

Northampton—Henry Phillips. Kent—John Keenan, John Kinney. Richmond—John M Hay, Alex Bell. Wakefield—Frank R Shaw, Albert Bell.

Wilmot—J F Williams, R Burns King. Wicklow—W J Owens, Clarence Estey.

Peel—Wm Tompkins, Edwin Melville. Simonds—William Rideout, Odbur Shaw.

Woodstock (parish)—F B Bull, John Flemming.

Woodstock Town—H T Stevens, W Balmain, J R Keenan.

The only absentee was Coun Alex Brown of Northampton, who is on business out of the county.

Coun Shaw, warden, was in the chair. After the reading and adoption of the minutes—

Mr Vince, auditor, said he had received no report since the last meeting of the council, and therefore he had no report to make. He said this was unfair to the sec-treas and unfair to the council and he thought something decisive should be done by the council. He could only suggest that the councillors should go to the collectors and make them report. The collectors who had not made returns were in the parishes of Kent and Brighton. One collector in Brighton had not reported for three years.

Coun Gillmor—Is that possible?

Mr Vince—Not only possible but a fact.

Coun Bradley said he had spoken again and again to Mr Currie who had not made returns. He had been at him over 25 times and every time the collector promised he would but he had not. He had told him that it made him ashamed to be before the council.

Coun Balmain on behalf of the Finance Committee, said that he believed the sec-treas had taken the necessary steps to secure the funds as required.

The sec-treas explained that he had had a conference with the chairman as to the advertising for tenders for the court house debentures. The advertisement will be at once and the debentures issued. He would suggest that the matter of advertising for sale of debentures be left till after dinner. In the meantime he could confer with the Finance Committee.

Coun Melville suggested that it would be a wise plan instead of paying \$1000 each year for the first thirteen years and \$2000 from that out to pay no principal until say 13 years so that the goal debt might be paid first.

Warden—It would be necessary to have a motion to reconsider.

Coun Melville said he was not wedded to his idea if the council was satisfied with the present arrangement.

Coun Phillips on behalf of the Building Committee said that the contract price for the Court House, outside of plumbing and heating, was \$21,930. This included \$200 repairs for the record office. Richard Allingham was appointed Inspector at the wages of \$300 a day to give all his time to the work. Mr Edgett was taking charge of the work of building

for the contractor. Mr Corbett and Mr Melville said that besides this work of inspecting by Mr Allingham, Mr Brodie the architect, was engaged to come once a month at \$20 a trip for general inspection. In regard to the heating, after conferring with the architect, the committee had decided to take out the old furnace in the court house and put in a new one, and this with the new furnace in the court house would afford a good heating apparatus. The Court House proper would be heated by hot air and the Record Office and lavatory with hot water. The Court House is to be furnished by the 1st of January next.

Coun Tompkins did not think much of the idea of a special inspector by the architect. Coun Melville said that Mr Brodie was particularly anxious to have this inspector, as he thought it would prevent neglect in the work. He would come at such time as he thought best, and without notice to contractor or workmen.

Coun Williams reported as follows on behalf of the committee appointed to wait on the government in the matter of the St John Valley Road:

We, the delegates appointed to wait on the local government in the matter of the St John Valley Railway, beg leave to report that we attended that duty and met at Fredericton with a number of delegates from St John and all the counties interested in the Road and appointed delegates to speak before the government, viz: Mr Foster, St John; Mayor Chestnut, Fredericton; S L Peters, Queens County; B F Smith, Florenceville. The delegates asked the government to guarantee the bonds to the amount of \$25,000 a mile. The Premier replied and promised the delegates that the government would grant the request if delegates would be sent to Ottawa, who would ask the Dominion Gov't to take over the line when completed on the 40 per cent and 60 per cent basis; that is if they would pay the local government 40 per cent to pay interest on the bonds and retain 60 per cent for running expenses etc. There were also a number of gentlemen appointed to form a company and to ask the government for a charter which meant some expense. We were asked for \$100 towards that fund which amount we promised and for which we ask a refund from the county. There has not been as much progress as we expected towards building the road, but we believe it must be built as the people are very much in earnest over it.

Coun Gillmor spoke on the subject. This railway must be built. There must be sleepers on the turf or wags on the green before long. There was no politics in this movement. While as much progress had not been made it was generally believed that the work would be carried out. The road must be built for the people demanded it.

Coun J R Brown moved that the report be accepted and the request be granted.

Coun Rideout seconded the motion.

Coun Melville wanted to know when this \$100.00 would be wanted.

Coun Williams said a charter was already granted. It was for the expenses of that charter that this \$100 was wanted.

Report received and recommendations were carried out.

Coun Owens moved that the delegates for the Valley Railway have their expenses paid to Fredericton.

Coun Kinney seconded the motion. Carried.

Coun Connolly speaking of a motion of which he had given notice to the effect that By-law, No 28, be amended by striking out the word "two" and writing "three," said this would mean that the councillors should be paid \$3 instead of \$2 a day. He would move now the resolution to that effect. He could not be charged with making this motion for a selfish purpose as he had come to the time of life when he had about made up his mind to retire. He thought with the expenses of county and council, the members were really out, and he did not believe that the representatives of the parish should be asked to do work for the county at a financial loss to themselves. He had declined nomination to the council next fall, as his hearing was much affected.

Coun Kinney seconded the motion. Coun Gillmor thought perhaps it would be as well to pay for the day coming. \$2.00 a day from the time they left home.

Coun Bradley—I am opposed to this motion because I think the people are paying us all that we earn. Even if there was no pay to the councillors it would be found that there would be no lack of aspirants for the office.

Coun Connolly—My day today is worth more than \$2. As to Mr Bradley's argument it is not always the man who wants the office who is the best qualified. Any man should be paid enough to cover his expenses. In January where we set two days, it means being away four days. He did not believe ten ratepayers in Brighton would oppose this motion.

Coun Burt thought this matter should be left for next council.

He moved a resolution that this matter be laid over till January.

Coun Phillips seconded the motion. Amendment carried.

Coun Williams moved that the council go into the accounts after dinner with the warden in the chair.

Council adjourned until 1.30. (Concluded next week.)
