British Capitalists Investing Largely in Canadian Industries.

MONTREAL, June 6.—Confirmation comes today of the rumor yesterday that the London interests which several months ago took an option on two millions of the common stock of the Canadian Textile Company, Limited, after purchasing outright a million of the same stock, have signified their desire to exercise the option. This means that no less than three millions of the entire common issue of five millions will be at once removed from the Canadian market, accounting in a great measure for the unusual strength of the Cotton stocks of late.

It will be remembered that when Sir Edward Clouston, Bart, returned from Europe some weeks ago he predicted that a great deal of English money would soon find its way to this market on account of the recent imports upon revenue by the present Government at Westminster.

This statement was also adhered to by Charles R Hosmer, who also declared that a great deal of the \$120,000,000 arriving from South Africa since the beginning of the year would undoubtedly come to Canada, which today is looked upon by business men and financiers as the world's last great bargain counter.

A call on Saturday at the leading Banks went to show that a good deal of money had already arrived from Great Britain to be invested in securities of unquestionable merit, and that inquiries were being made every day in the same direction. Many of which are sure to lead the large purchases of local securities.

The real interest which London is now manifesting in Canadian stocks means more perhaps to the dominion, and to her industrial life than anything that has ever happened during the past quarter of a century, or since the inauguration of the National Policy making Canada a manufacturing country.


