Laziest Man in the World Found.

London, Sept. 20.—Sentence of six months' hard labor was passed on Thursday at Tottenham Police Court on Archibald Depau, of Suffolk Place, West Green, who has been described as the laziest man in the world. He was charged with neglecting his wife and children.

On every occasion that the N.S.P. C.C.C. inspector, Mr. Young, had called, the defendant was found in bed, said Mr. Windsor, who prosecuted. Some years ago Depau was a potman at a public-house at Highgate, but since then he had done no work.

He not only refused to work, but he lay in bed all day, leaving his wife and family to support themselves as best they could. On one occasion the relieving officer found some work for the defendant at a stone yard, but he refused to leave his bed.

"In fact," said Mr. Windsor, "I think that if possible the defendant would get some one else to breathe for him."

Even when his wife dragged him out of bed to look for work he returned to it, making various excuses, that he was too old, he was too cold, his clothing was not good enough, he wanted new teeth, he wanted his hair dyed, or he wanted a wig.

When his wife's back was turned he would crawl out of bed and help himself to the children's food, and then creep back again.

The defendant's wife told the magistrate that her husband lay in bed for weeks at a time. On one occasion she lifted him and the bed he was in in order to make him leave it.

Another time, after a long struggle with him, she managed to get him out of his bedroom, and chased him out of the house with a poker, but he crept back again in the evening through the window.

Medical evidence was given that the defendant was mentally sound.

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IN THE MATTER OF "THE NEW BRUNSWICK JOINT STOCK COMPANIES ACT."

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that application will be made under The New Brunswick Joint Stock Companies Act to the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council for a grant of Letters Patent under the Great Seal of the Province of New Brunswick, constituting the applicants and others who may become shareholders in the Company proposed to be created, a body corporate and politic, for the purposes and objects hereinafter mentioned.

The proposed name of the Company is "C. M. SHERWOOD LIMITED."

The objects for which the incorporation of the Company is sought are as follows:

1. To acquire and take over as a going concern the business now carried on in the Parishes of Wilnot and Wicklow in the County of Carleton, by C. Miles Sherwood and all or any of the assets and liabilities of the said C. Miles Sherwood in connection with the said business, except the saw-mill property of the said C. Miles Sherwood.

2. To establish and conduct a general department store, and carry on a general wholesale and retail mercantile business.

3. To carry on all or any of the businesses of wholesale and retail dry-goods merchants, furriers, haberdashers, importers, dealers of and in textile fabrics, milliners, dressmakers, tailors, hatters, clothiers, furnishing, outfitters, gloves, boot and shoe dealers, dealers of and in leather goods, household furniture, carpets, rugs, furnishings, china and glassware, crockery and other household fittings, and utensils, sporting goods, ornaments, bric-a-brac, jewellery, stationery, notions and fancy goods, books, musical instruments, meats, groceries, provisions, drugs, chemicals, and all other articles of merchandise of personal and household use and consumption; and, generally, of and in all manufactured goods, materials, provisions and produce.

4. To carry on a general wholesale and retail business in hardware of all kinds, paints and oils, farm tools and machinery, iron, stoves and furnaces, plumber's supplies, painters' supplies, fertilizers, kitchen utensils, cattle and horse foods, doors and windows, and other house-finish and wood-work, lime, brick, cement, coal, firewood, tin, and articles made of tin, bicycles and motor-carriages.

5. To produce, purchase, sell and deal in butter, cheese, eggs, milk, vegetables, hay, oats, potatoes, poultry and other food, farm and dairy products, and the various materials entering into or used in the production thereof, and to carry on a general warehousing and cold storage business.

6. To buy, sell, manufacture, repair, alter and exchange, let or hire, export, and deal in all kinds of articles and things which may be required for the purposes of conducting or manufacturing farm products; and also to acquire saw-mills and factories, timber lands, and all other property which may be considered necessary in connection therewith, and to operate saw-mills and to operate and carry on wood-working and do a general wood-working business.

8. To build, maintain, acquire, lease and operate grist mills, flour mills, feed mills, and any other mills for the purpose of grinding or manufacturing farm products; and also starch factories; to purchase and sell grain and cereals of every kind, and to manufacture, buy and sell flour and other food articles manufactured from grain or cereals.

9. To build, maintain, acquire, lease and operate carding mills and all kinds of mills for manufacturing cloth of every kind, to buy and sell wool and all constituent parts of cloth.

10. To construct, purchase, lease or otherwise acquire buildings, halls, theatres and rooms, for the purpose of public entertainments, theatres, concerts, operas, and all similar purposes, and to let or to hire said buildings, halls, theatres, and rooms for said purposes, and to carry on the business of conducting concerts or theatres or plays, and to produce and present theatrical plays and operas.

11. To carry on any other business which may seem to the Company capable of being conveniently carried on in connection with the above, or calculated directly or indirectly to enhance the value of the Company's property or rights.

12. To carry on the business of electricians, mechanical engineers and manufacturers, and workers and dealers in electricity, motive power, heat and light, and any business in which the application of electricity or any power is or may be useful or convenient, or any other business of a like nature, and to manufacture and produce, trade and deal in any thing, belonging to such business, and all things used in connection therewith, or with any inventions or patents; to produce and accumulate electricity and supply the same for the production transmission or use of power, for lighting, heating and motive purposes or otherwise, and to light streets, places and buildings by means of electricity or otherwise; to construct, maintain and operate works for the supply and distribution of electricity; to use, manufacture, operate and equip telephones, including all wires and apparatus, connecting electric apparatus, and including the formation of electric exchanges or centres, to purchase or otherwise acquire and to sell, work or otherwise deal with land, water, water power, water power supply and water power work and equipment or works; to make connections with or to amalgamate with other telephone companies; to undertake, construct, acquire or carry on works of all kinds relating to any business of the Company, and to enter into such contracts and make such arrangements as may be necessary to carry out the same; and, generally, to carry on the business of an electric light Company and telephone Company.

13. For the purposes in the last preceding paragraph set forth to enter from time to time upon any public streets, roads, squares, open plots of ground, or highways, in the County of Carleton and in the County of Victoria in the Province of New Brunswick, and break up and open such public roads, streets, squares, plots of ground or highways, or any part thereof, for the purpose and with the power of erecting and maintaining poles and posts pipes or conduits, and stringing and maintaining wires for telephone or electric light purposes, and for renewing or repairing the same; and the powers in this paragraph mentioned to be exercised subject to such limitations and conditions as the Lieutenant Governor in Council may prescribe.

14. To subscribe for and take shares of stock in any other Company or Companies having objects in whole or in part similar to the objects of the proposed Company, and to pay for the said shares either in cash or by real or personal property or with shares in the proposed Company, and to acquire and undertake the business, assets and liabilities of any person, firm or Company.
