Scene of the Strike.

The Sydney coal-field, which has been much in the public eye of late owing to the strike at Glace Bay and Sydney, occupies the eastern shore of Cape Breton County. Its land area is estimated at 200 square miles, and it now forms the rim of an extensive coal deposit extending well out under the Atlantic. A careful estimate made some time ago puts the amount of available coal in these submarine areas at not less than 2,000,000,000 tons.

Nearly all the seams lie at easy angles, yield little water, and, owing to the generally fine character of the roof, they can be mined with cheapness and safety. So strongly marked is the impermeable nature of the strata, that at a moderate depth the submarine workings are perfectly dry.

The coals of this district are bituminous and are especially adapted for gas and coke making and for steam purposes. The Sydney coal is largely used in the Maritime provinces for domestic purposes, and large quantities find their way to the blasting furnaces of the Dominion Iron & Steel plant. Official reports made to the British Admiralty show that it contains 83.5 per centum of carbon, and that it is practically equal to Welsh steam coal. Newfoundland and sealing steamers prefer Cape Breton coal to all other owing to the rapidity with which it raises steam.

Some idea of the enormous amount of available coal contained in this district may be gathered from the fact that the seams now open contain millions of tons.

BELIEVES CHRIST IS ALWAYS HERE

Rev Mr Anthony on the Second Coming

In the Congregational Church last evening Rev S B Anthony, speaking on the coming of Christ, spoke in part as follows:

Many, from time to time, declare their conviction that Christ is to come in visible presence. When he comes, an audible trumpet is to be blown and the disciples are to be caught up to meet him in the air. The great result looked for is the putting down of evil and the establishment of good in the world, not by moral, but by physical agency. The belief is essentially that more agencies are insufficient for the conversion of the world and must be supplemented by irresistible divine force.

Christianity, however, is the power that overcomes evil with good. Faith, love and goodness are the forces with which Christianity has achieved its success, and if Christ reigns in the earth, he must do so by these means; and if men are compelled to submit by a revelation of power, then it is clear they do not bow to Christ and worship him, but bow to force and worship that.

We are not to be concerned with the outward and visible coming, but the inward and spiritual. Which is better, to be caught up outwardly to meet him in the air or inwardly into communion with his Spirit? If he should come setting on clouds, surrounded by angels, blowing a trumpet, with power to work miracles it would be no real coming to those unprepared. He would be no nearer them than he is now.

This is what Christ's coming means to me. He is not a historic Christ who lived centuries ago a few short years and then departed to be an absentee Christ and is to come again in some far off age. For if anything is clearly taught in the New Testament it is that the coming of Christ is perpetual. And he who lived then lives now. He touches hares and they become homes; touches laws and they become just; touches music and art and they become high and pure; touches marriage and it becomes a sacrament; touches the cradle and the babe becomes a child of God; touches the grave and it becomes a door to immortal life. He is here touching sorrow, righting wrong, reaching the ignorant, transforming men and women and aiding them to live pure and noble lives in imitation of the Divine example and in the hope of a glorious immortality. Therefore, do not ask how shall Christ come, or when shall he appear for we will not find an answer by studying prophecy or calculating the seventy weeks of Daniel.

He is here now. Whenever we try to do our duty, trusting in God; whenever we will help and comfort some weary soul; whenever we will forgive those whom we think have injured us; when we will put out of our heart envy and low ambition and self-conceit and give ourselves to what is generous and true and lovely, then we will discover that Christ has already come, for his hour cometh always and is now.

IF THE LAND IS THERE CANADA OWNS IT.

So the Cabinet Has Intimated to Britain With Regard to Arctic Discovery.

Ottawa, Sep. 12.—As a result of the discovery of the North Pole and the planting of the American flag there the question has been raised in the British House of Commons by Sir Gilbert Parker as to the ownership of all the lands intervening between the Pole and the territory now marked as Canada on the map. An answer will be given to the question in the British House tomorrow. It is understood that the matter was under discussion at the last meeting of the cabinet council here and that a statement has been sent to the Colonial Office intimating that Canada claims all the land intervening between the American border and the North Pole. So far as is known, all the islands in the Arctic Ocean west of Greenland have already been formally claimed by Canada, one of the objects of Captain Bernier's expedition in the Arctic two years ago being to formally take possession of and place the British flag on all islands to the north. Commander Peary in his report of his trip to the Pole does not tell of finding any land north of Grant Land which is recognized as Canadian territory. From there to the Pole is evidently an ice covered ocean. Consequently, although Canada claims all land as far north as the Pole, as being Canadian hinterland, there is not likely to be any basis for the United States claim to ownership. The Pole itself being two miles above water, belongs to all nations.

Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$800.00.
