The shooting affair in Plaster Rock with its attending expense that will necessarily fall upon the people of Victoria County makes us, as it should every person in this province, sit up and take notice. Here is a company, yes, two companies doing business in this province, the C.P.R. and G.T.P. The C.P.R., a private company, brings such people as these Italians into the country because they get them for wages that a white man would starve on. These Italians are a class of people who are more or less always ready to shoot or stab. It makes no difference whether it is one of their own number or whether it is not, the revolver or knife is always ready to be used on the slightest provocation.

These companies are the means by which these people are among us. Now, this being so, we think it no more than right that they should bear at least half of the expense of the trials of these criminals.

They could get plenty of white men to do their work if they would give enough wages for the white man to live on thereby eliminating the evil but they will not, instead, go right against the law referring to the Alien Labor Act and import men here with the result that the counties through which these people are working, are always on the anxious seat. Their lives are in a way, always in danger; then again, taxes are ever on the increase and at present, the county of Victoria has had to bear the expense of two criminals and will probably have to stand the expense of another hanging. The very least will be the expense of the trial. It is a shame that the good people of the county just north of us has to be put to this big expense.

Carleton County people will also have to dig down in their pockets and fish up a much larger tax every time there is a shooting like the one at Beechwood.

The people of the province are supporting an institution in Dorchester. Why not after giving these people a trial, if they are convicted of murder, send them to Dorchester to pay the penalty on the scaffold. No matter what crime a man commits, outside of murder, if his sentence amounts to two years, he is sent to this institution and the province pays for it. Then why make the distinction between Capital and non-capital offenses. The counties through which these railroads run will, no doubt, in time have the same trouble to deal with, and should use their influence towards having legislature make some move to relieve each country from bearing this extra burden brought on them by these companies and towards making it a provincial affair in all capital cases instead of leaving each county to bear the great burden themselves.

In the election of County Councillors which will soon take place we notice in Brighton that Mr. Connell has retired from public life, so far, that he will not run again in the coming election. Mr. Bradley who has been an honest and able representative for a goodly number of years is still in the field. He has served his parish in an able manner. He has been conscientious in all debates that he has taken part in the wishes of his constituents has always been his first thought. Fitted against him are Mr. Britton and Mr. C. E. Morgan, both good men, but untired. We know that the rate payers of the parish of Brighton are wise as to which one or two of the candidates will be the right men to look after their welfare in the county council meetings. We would, without wanting to meddle in the affairs of the Parish of Brighton, just like to keep the name of Allen Bradley to the front and to ask the rate payers to remember that he is one man on whom they "can" rely to further their interests in the future as he has done in the past.

Thanks for your interest in the fight being made. Its the concern of us all—Editor.

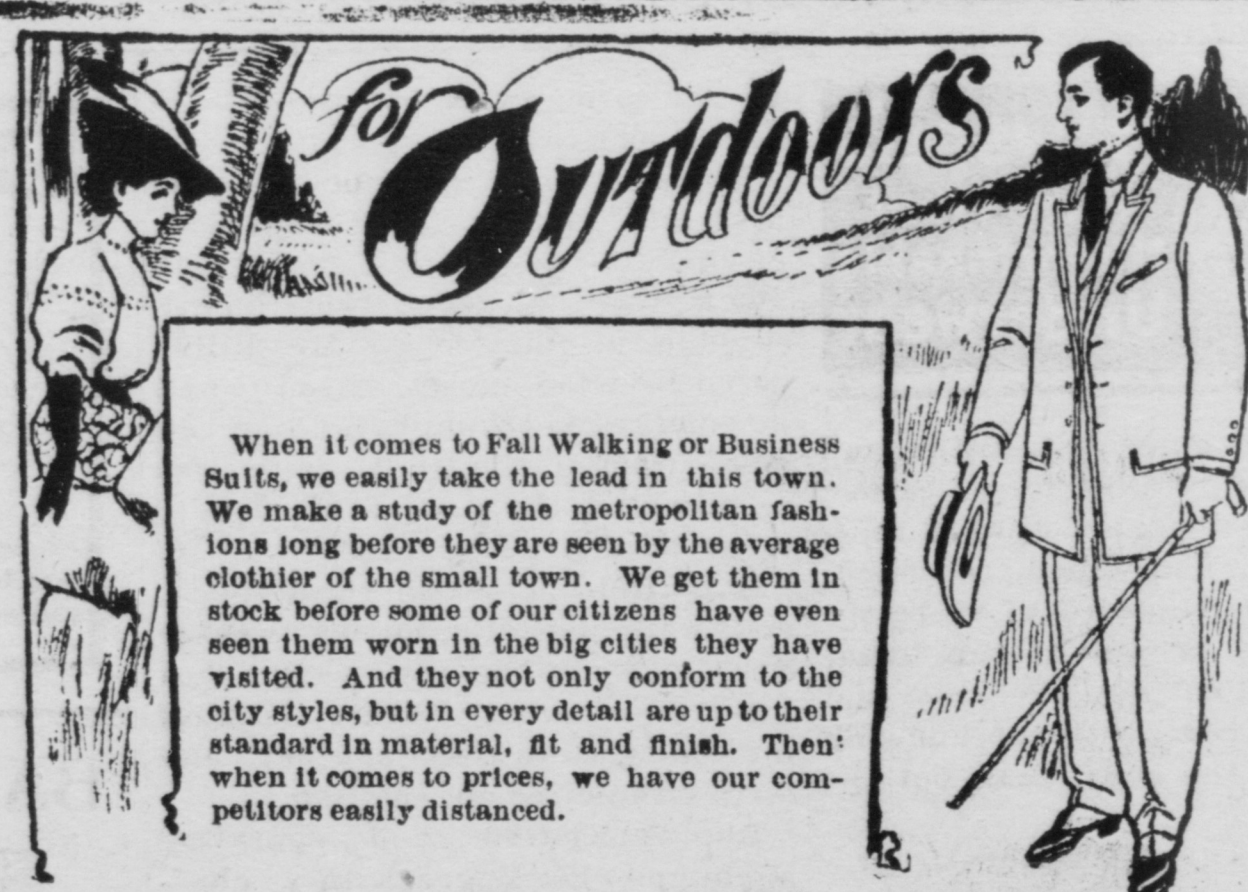
## Labor Day.

## Prosperity is Shown by Customs Returns.

Ottawa, Aug. 31.—The Canadian treasury is being considerably benefited by the prevailing prosperity. During the five months of the fiscal year, ending today the customs collections totalled \$23,368,610 which is \$1,208,818 more than was collected during the same period last year. During August alone the collections totalled \$5,840,456, a betterment of 964,311.
