### War Sloop Sunk In 1777 Is Lifted.

Treasures of restored Fort Ticonderoga will include a British sloop of war which yesterday was lifted from Lake Champlain near the old stone pier of the venerable stronghold where she was burned to the water's edge in 1777 by the American forces.

News that the vessel had been successfully raised came to New York through a telegram to Stephen H P Bell, whose wife, a daughter of Colonel Robert M Thompson, owns the historic fortification and is restoring it as when it was captured by Colonel Ethan Allen and his Green Mountain Boys. The vessel was found on the bottom of the lake by Mr Bell, and Alfred C Bossom, the architect in charge of the restoration, while they were exploring the shore front. The soundings also revealed the outline of the stone pier, where in the old days, according to authenticated maps, vessels of war were moored.

Ticonderoga was recaptured from the British in 1777 by Colonel Brown, of Massachusetts, and the records tell that he burned the sloop and also two smaller vessels. All three craft have been found and the other two will shortly be raised. The ice on the lake was cut away to enable the searchers to work.

The sloop is ninety in length, and is, with the exception of the upper deck, in an excellent state of preservation, despite its 132 years' immersion.

In the bow were two large cannon balls. The gun which was mounted on the sloop is believed to be also at the bottom not far from where the vessel was found. The craft will be placed in the garden at the rear of the fort, where in years to come it may be seen by all visitors. The garden itself is to be arranged just as it was in Colonial days.

Notice is hereby given that application will be made by the Quebec and New Brunswick Railway Company to the Parliament of Canada, at its present session, for an Act amending the Acts respecting the said Railway Company in the following manner:—

(1) By increasing the bonding powers of the Company to \$5,000 per mile;

(2) By fixing and extending the times for the commencement and completion of its lines of railway;

(3) By empowering the Company to lay out, construct and operate a railway of the gauge of four feet eight and one half inches from a point on its railway authorized by chapter 75 of the Statutes of 1907, at or near Connor Station in New Brunswick, to Centerville by the most convenient route in the neighborhood of the international boundary line, thence to Woodstock and from Woodstock by the St. John River valley to St. John, passing through the counties of Madawaska, Victoria, Carleton, York, Sunbury, Queens, Kings and St. John, in the Province of New Brunswick.
