Great Bog Slide In Ireland.

As a sequel to the recent heavy
snowstorms, followed by equally
heavy rains, in Ireland, several ser-
ious mishaps have occurred. The
most serious of these accidents was
a bog slide at Kilmore Village, near
Ballygar, in Galway. At the foot of
Mount Mary, the slopes of which are
covered with heath and bog over
several thousands of acres, there
are little hamlets, occupied by small
farmers, whose principal business is
the cutting and sale of turf. The
alarm was given by some cottagers,
who awoke to find the house sur-
rounded by bog, and a great half-
liquid mass moving down the moun-
tain side. The occupants of the
neighboring houses found them-
selves in a similar predicament, as
they narrowly escaped with their
lives, not having time enough to
dress themselves. The ca' in of an
old woman named McDonnell was
almost entirely submerged, only the
chimney appearing above the mass,
and the occupant was buried in the
ruins. Several small farmers lost
their stock.

DAILY BATH INJURIOUS.

Ornished Custom of Anglo-
Saxon Race Knocked on
the Head.

One of the most cherished tradi-
tions of the British race, the "cold
tub every morning," is mercilessly
criticised by Dr J H Clarke of London
in "Vital Economy; or, How to Con-
serve Your Strength," published re-
cently.

Dr Clarke contends that in the
matter of health, we are enslaved by
words and phrases. "The 'pores of
the skin' is a phrase at the shrine of
which many feeble folk are sacrific-
ing the last flicker of their energy in
the daily morning tub. 'Plenty of
fresh air' is another tyrant which
has claimed numberless victims.

"I once lost a good patient, who
was always ailing, by cutting off his
daily morning tub," says Dr Clarke.
"He grew strong and put on weight,
and it is one of his delights to shock
his friends by telling them how many
years it is since he had a bath!"

Too much soaping and scrubbing,
according to Dr Clarke, remove the
lubricating material secreted in the
glands of the skin to make it soft and
supple, and the removal leaves the
skin more sensitive to atmospheric
changes.

The skin is a self-cleansing organ.
By soaking the body the self-cleans-
ing cells absorb water, swell up and
die.

"One has only to rub oneself after
a bath and they come off in little
rolls. These do not consist of dirt,
as is the popular idea, but of dead
skin cells. I often tell people that
it is quite possible for them to wash
themselves dirty. They remove so
much of the protecting surface that
they give the dirt a real chance of
getting into their skins."

Dr Clarke recommends as a substi-
tute for a bath a folded towel, wetted
in the center and passed rapidly all
over the body. This will "open the
pores" sufficiently without entailing
any shock.

Hot Onions Cure for Pneumonia.

Hot onions, according to a French
physician, are said to be a sure cure
for pneumonia. The remedy is as
follows: Take six or ten onions, ac-
cording to size, and chop fine, put
in a large pan over a fire, then add
the same quantity of rye meal and
vinegar enough to make a thick
paste. In the meantime stir it thor-
oughly, letting it simmer for five or
ten minutes. Then put in a cotton
bag large enough to cover the lungs
and apply to chest as hot as patient
can bear. In about ten minutes ap-
ply another, and thus continue by
reheating the poultices, and in a
few hours the patient will be out of
danger. This simple remedy has
never failed to cure this too often
fatal malady. Usually three or four
applications will be sufficient.

The Horse Disappearing.

That which was prophesied half in-
jest a few years ago is now actually
coming to pass. The horse is disap-
pearing from England, and the Board
of Trade returns afford the proof of
it. Anyone who notices the traffic of
London will understand that the
teams, the motor omnibuses, the
motor vans, the private motors and
the taxi-cabs have driven the horse
off the streets, and in all the pro-
vincial towns the same thing is going
on. And it is not only in the towns
that the change has taken place.
The trams are spreading out into
the country, services of motor omni-
buses cover the roads, and even the
farmers are getting rid of their
horses. We still breed the most ex-
pensive race horses and the most
magnificent specimens of giant cart
horses, but the ordinary everyday
animal, which a few years ago did
the work all over England, is being
replaced by the motor in its various
forms, and the farmers have almost
entirely ceased to breed horses.

In the days of the land troubles in
Ireland, as Frank O'Malley, the Irish
patriot has it, two tenants were told
off to lie in wait behind a hedge and
kill a particularly offensive landlord.
They were told that this landlord al-
ways came in from town at half-past
five o'clock in the evening, never

top of a bit of a hill, and sat behind a
hedge. It came half-past five and
no landlord had been along. One of
them went and took a look over the
brow of the hill. No one was in sight.
