

### The Bread Basket.

Twenty-five years ago probably there were few Canadians who fully appreciated the possibilities of their country, the western part of it particularly. In 1885 the Rev Joseph Cook, a famous American clergyman and lecturer, delivered an address before the Boston Monday Club in which he told his hearers about the new country in the north. It is of interest now to note how Canada has demonstrated the truth of many things the clergyman said in a speech which many thought venturesome a quarter of a century ago.

"Let us not underrate the British States of North America," he said. "It has been my fortune lately, in Manitoba and in British Columbia, to meet with experiences which have given me a new conception of the dignity of the Canadian Dominion. Conversing with a professor of a university, in the beautiful and energetic city of Winnipeg, while a map of North America was opened before us, I put my compasses down, one foot on St Paul, and left the other swinging about the chart. 'Now,' said I to my informant, 'how far north must I carry this loose foot of the compass to reach the furthest border of your good wheat lands?' 'You must carry it north,' said he, 'to the Peace River in Athabaska. On the banks of that stream the buffalo and their young may be seen feeding on grass on the tenth of May.' I opened the compasses until they reached the Peace River, some 1,500 miles northwest of St Paul, then swung the compasses around, and their northernmost point, when carried east, stood in the Atlantic Ocean, and when carried to the south it stood in the Gulf. Incredible as the assertion may appear, there is more arable land northwest of St Paul than east of it. Our American consul at Winnipeg, the Hon. Mr Taylor, told me that he is accustomed to divide North America into three belts—the cotton belt, the maize belt, and wheat belt—and that, in his judgment, three-quarters of the wheat belt lies north of international line."

In our day the movement of American farmers across the border to take up wheat farms in the Canadian West shows how well the value and significance of the northern wheat belt are appreciated by our neighbors. Maine, New Hampshire and Vermont seek in vain for settlers to till their abandoned farms. The people who went from the New England states to the American West are moving north, into the granary of the Empire.—Telegraph.
