The report of the Board of Health was submitted as follows:			
Hartland, N. B., Jan 11th 1909.			
To The Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of Carleton:			
GENTLEMEN,—I beg to submit the annual report for 1908 of the Local Board of Health, District number 10.			
Small pox visited us again this year. In April cases were reported from the Parish of Kent. The infection having been brought from the Tobique by men returning from the lumber woods. The first cases being mild it was pretty well scattered before being recognized. Dr M E Commings of Bath was engaged by the Board to take charge, and in about eight weeks the disease was stamped out. There were in all some seventeen cases, one of which was fatal. The fatal case was that of a man over fifty years of age and was of the confluent holmonhagic variety. Later some ten cases occurred in the parishes of Wilmot and Wicklow, which were attended to by Dr H W Peppers of Centreville. The bills are herewith submitted. All efforts were made to handle the epidemic as cheaply as possible.			
About twelve cases of diphtheria occurred in the parish of Northampton. There was some cost to the Board in these cases the bills for which have not been settled and will be submitted later. The Board respectfully asks for an appropriation for 1909 of three hundred dollars (\$300 00).

the speaker, told him to get out. This was when the boy was taken sick.

Coun Gillmore said he didn't see any remedy but to pay that bill. If the small-pox spreads the Board of Health could be held responsible.

Coun Estey—Dr Commings was employed by Dr Curtis to look after the small-pox cases and I think he was in his rights.

Coun Kinney—At the time I employed Dr Ross, Dr Commings was employed by the Board and was sick. Was I to allow my boy to die because Dr Commings was sick? Was I to wait till he got better? Was I not to employ anyone? When Dr Commings got better he drove by our door and charged everytime he went by. I think the council should not be called to pay for this. According to the bill Dr Commings fumigated my house three times. He only did it twice.

Warden—The Chairman of the Board of Health is notified of an epidemic. He employed a doctor to take charge, and in this place Dr Commings was employed by the chairman. I do not see how we can help paying the bills.

Coun Tompkins—The chairman must have known Dr Commings was sick. John Kinney's family was sick. No provision was made to fill Dr Commings place and Mr Kinney had to look after this himself.

Warden—I understood that when Dr Ross was employed by Mr Kinney, it was not known it was small pox. Dr Commings was called when this was known. Motion Carried.

Dr D W Ross, \$10 10.
A delegation from the Upper Woodstock School Board was heard. Through Coun Flemming who moved that the piece of land connected with the school house which has been leased for \$1.00 a year for some time past be given out right.

Coun Melville did not believe in giving it away. He moved in amendment that the land be leased for one year at one dollar.

Coun Connolly did not believe the time had come for giving away little pieces of land as souvenirs of the Court House. I think we had better not give anything away till we see what we will do with the property. Amendment was carried.

The following committee was appointed on the assessment for the coming year. Couns Balmain, Williams and Estey.

Coun Gillmore said a petition was before the council as to the sale of lager beer in his parish. He was informed that by the decision of the Court, it was illegal to sell lager beer, the same as whiskey. This would effectually deal with the matter. He wished his position understood in connection with the matter. The only reason why the petition would not be pressed was because by the decision of the Court there was a better remedy. People in this county who sell lager beer are violating the law and on being so found could be punished.

Coun Rideout explained that the parish clerk of Simonds was paid \$3 for hall last year by an error and he was willing to take that for the coming year.

The chairman appointed the following standing committees:—
FINANCE—Couns Balmain, Williams and Estey.

BUILDING—Couns Phillips, Melville and A G Bell.

The lists of the parish officers were confirmed.

Council adjourned till 1.30 p m.

AFTER RECESS

The assessment for poor purposes was then taken up and was as follows:—

Coun Tompkins moved, seconded by Coun Melville, that the assessors revisors and collectors pay be fixed at same amount as last year. Carried.

Coun Flemming moved, seconded by Coun Bell, that \$150 be assessed to the Parish of Woodstock and charged to Upper Woodstock road district. \$75 to go for sidewalks and \$75 for road purposes.

Coun Balmain submitted report of finance committee as follows:—
Your committee which was ap-

pointed to confer with the auditor in reference to the amount required to be assessed upon the several parishes, for the ensuing year, and make up the estimates beg leave to report that they have attended to that duty, and would recommend that the sum of \$8,000 be assessed for Co purposes for the ensuing year.

Coun Williams moved that the above be received and recommendations carried out, and that one half the indebtedness of each parish be added to the warrant at the time it was issued. Seconded and carried.

G W Hatfield applied to the Council for a renewal of his lease for a wire ferry between Simonds and Peel, and on motion of Coun Shaw, seconded by Coun Melville, it was resolved that the petition be granted.

Inspector Colpitts said with reference to the Perkins case last year there were convictions on six cases, the costs were all paid up to that date, and they had given notice of appeal. It was not taken, and finally we agreed to settle for four cases and costs on the six, which made \$320. While the costs were paid Mr Dibblee was not paid, which was \$30. That added to the deficit of \$290 made \$320.

A by-law authorizing the Council through the Warden and Treasurer, to borrow \$5000 from the Royal Bank of Canada, until the taxes are collected, on their names, the said officials to give promissory notes for that amount, interest to be paid at the rate of six per cent, was submitted, prepared by the bank authorities.

After considering it, Coun Bell moved, seconded by Coun J R Brown, that the finance committee and the sec-treasurer be authorized to borrow an amount up to \$5000 from any chartered bank. Carried.

Coun Melville moved the following resolution, seconded by Coun Williams:

Resolved—That in the opinion of Carleton County Council, in session assembled, the Highway Act 1908 is a good act and we wish to see it proclaimed at the earliest moment; we are however of the opinion that Sec 8 which provides that the poll tax be assessed to be amended to read \$1.50. And that the Secretary-Treasurer be requested to forward a copy of this resolution to Chief Commissioner Morrissey.

Coun Connolly asked if that is all the discussion on this road law this County Council was going to indulge in. He thought it would have been well if this Council had discussed the matter further.

Coun Gillmore moved, seconded by Coun Kinney, a motion approving of the old Highway Act.

On motion, Couns Gillmore, Kinney, Keenan and Bradley voted yes, rest of Councilors nay.

Coun Williams presented a petition as follows asking that the parish of Wilmot be divided for election purposes for the County Council.

Moved and seconded that the parish of Wilmot be divided for election purposes and two Polling places be established instead of one as at present, one at Lakeville and one at Centreville. Commencing at the international boundary line between land owned by William London and Donald Merrilth running east on a straight line to Good Settlement road, thence continuing east between land owned by Pellicer Good and Eli Watters, continuing on a line north side of Thomas Emery, also east between land owned by W J Emery and John McEggon, continuing east to parish of Simonds. All on south side of said line to vote at Lakeville and all north of said line to vote at Centreville.

Coun King seconded motion which carried.

Coun Lamont submitted the following report on the Scott Act Inspectors report.

To the Warden and County Councilors of Carleton County:

We, your committee, appointed to examine the Scott Act Inspector's accounts, beg leave to submit the following:

We have examined his accounts and find the same correct, also vouchers attached for all payments made. The Inspector reports \$824.54 of a deficit, but we find \$739.45 in excess, a difference of \$85.09, which sum is in his hands.

The total receipts from fines for the year is \$1582.00. Expenses in prosecuting the Act \$2406.34.

We recommend W P Jones' bill and also that of Wm Dibblee, Police Magistrate, to the consideration of the board.

In reference to the petition from a number of rate-payers from Parish of Richmond, we would strongly recommend that the Canada Temperance Act be enforced according to law, and endeavor to wipe out all the run holes along the line. All of which is respectfully submitted.
