Political Pointers.

This week we devote a goodly portion of our space to the official report of the County Council. The county fathers have at length solved the court house problem in a manner that should prove generally acceptable. Certainly this fine county can quite as well as its neighbors afford a decent court house.

Parliament met Wednesday. The dispatches state that Hon Charles Marcell is the new presiding officer of the Commons. Those of our readers who heard this eloquent French-Canadian address the Provincial Liberal Convention in St John two or three years ago will realize that no mistake has been made in his selection. Speaker Marcell is a fine type of the educated, French-Canadian. Eloquent in either language, personally a good fellow, and having the respect of everyone, he cannot fail to be an ornament to the Commons.

The great still-born road act is receiving a rather discouraging reception. The different county councils seem utterly indisposed to say a good word for it. True our own county fathers publicly damned it with faint praise, but their inmost feelings were by no means expressed in the resolution. Albert, St John, York, Sunbury and other counties have united in condemning the measure, either wholly or in part.

Mr Borden has after all decided to sit for Halifax, abandoning his place of refuge, Carleton, Ont. Whether some other direct conservative politician will be picked up by the voters of that recent refuge of the opposition leader we cannot say. It may be that the electors will insist upon a man of their own choosing.

The Ottawa correspondent of the St John Sun writes his paper that in the new seating plan in the Commons the member for this county has been transferred from the Liberal overflow on the Opposition side to the third row on the government side, along with A K McLean of Lunenburg, N.S.

Premier Hazen will soon have to face the legislature. With mutiny and discord in his own following he is in no position to face the strong and vigorous onslaught which will be made by the straight Opposition. The government's path will be no bed of roses.

A Seed Fair.

S J Moore, superintendent of the Dominion Seed Dept for the Maritime Provinces, was in town on Wednesday making preliminary arrangements for the holding of the annual seed fair in this town. Mr Moore waited upon Secretary Smith of the Agricultural Society who signified his intention of bringing the matter before the Directors at an early date. While as yet there is no fixed time for the fair it is pretty safe to say that it will be held sometime in March. The farmers and seed growers will do well to keep it in mind, as very generous prizes are offered. Further announcements will be made later on.

The man did not say what Mr Forbes called it, but he did say that it was not 'Arkeel,' as the horse was called at Readville, nor yet 'Akeel' or 'Akillie.' For our part we have no doubt that the proper pronunciation is as we have stated above. Dan R Sutherland, of Picton, who has travelled extensively among the French people of Quebec, says that it is absurd to pronounce it in any other way than that we give it.—James A Fraser, in Eastern Chronicle.
