Zam-Buk

Referring to the present local option law in New Brunswick under which a majority of the voters in a ward or parish may vote out the saloons, Dr Shearer, in his speech before the Every Day Club in Quebec, made a suggestion that will interest friends of temperance reform. He said he would like to see conditions reversed. Let prohibition and not license be the normal condition. Then if it were desired to have liquor sold in any ward or parish put the burden upon those who desired to sell. Let them be compelled to take around the petitions for signature, and bring on the vote, asking that license be temporarily granted in the ward or parish. Dr Shearer expressed the view that no public man could reasonably object to this charge which would immeasurably advance the cause of total abstinence and prohibition. He, in discussing the temperance question of Canada has been assured by the clergy and laity that while the present prohibition law is not ideal it is greatly in advance of the Scott Act, as the Scott Act is ahead of a license. He then discussed the general question and said that the four agencies, religion, morals, science and economics, are arrayed against the barroom and it must go down never to rise again. Science tells man what it does to his body, religion and ethics what it does to his character and soul, and economics, represented by the employers of labor, make it pay men to be sober, because they discriminate against the man who drinks. The great railways and great industrial corporations make this discrimination. Some of those who are the most deeply submerged in drink are the ones who most earnestly pray for prohibition, ones who are the helpless victims of the drink habit.
