Street Etiquette at the Capital

On Saturday morning about ten
o'clock two men were standing op-
posite the city hall on Elgin street
when an elderly respectable looking
Chinaman passed by. Without the
slightest warning or provocation,
one of the roughs struck the Chin-
aman a blow on the side of the head
and laughed at him as he hurried
away rubbing his head. This oc-
curred in front of city hall and within
a hundred yards of police head-
quarters, but, of course, there were
no police in sight. The man who
committed the assault was quite
well dressed, as was his companion,
and apparently considered the cow-
ardly act rather a joke.

Annually the British ministry lays
before parliament a detailed state-
ment of the nation's liabilities and
assets. In that submitted recently
covering the fiscal year ended March
31, is one item which bears witness
to the profitable foresight of Great
Britain in buying the Khedive's Suez
Canal shares. These were purchased
in 1876 for about \$20,000,000 and are
to-day appraised at \$160,000,000, an
eightfold increase in a little more
than three decades. The block was
composed of 176,602 shares, making
Great Britain the largest holder of
canal stock. The money worth of
the shares is not their greatest value
to their owner, since with their pos-
session has come virtual control of
the great trade route to the East.
So well is this control established
that while the majority of the stock
is still in other hands the voting
power of Great Britain is decisive.

Mrs Isabel Adams, widow of A.
Adams, the so-called "policy king,"
told in the New York Supreme Court
on Wednesday how she had entrusted
a promissory note for \$30,000 to the
care of Mrs. Marguerite Gilbert,
a clairvoyant, upon the representa-
tion of the latter that with it in her
possession Mrs. Gilbert would be able
to forestall a "great danger" which
had been revealed to her superna-
turally as impending over the family
of Mrs. Adams.
