On Tuesday of this week the Rev R G Fulton and family began their journey from Woodstock to Vancouver, B.C. where Mr Fulton has a Church awaiting him. In the removal of Mr Fulton the Town loses one of its best and most energetic citizens; one who has always shown a deep interest in everything appertaining to the welfare of the town.

What he has accomplished for the Methodist Church of which he was pastor is evidenced in part by the splendid church edifice in which the congregation now worships, which will long stand as a monument to his energy and perseverance. That his labors were appreciated by the members of his church and congregation is attested to by unanimous resolutions passed by both the official and Trustee Boards of his church, expressing appreciation of the work done, and deep regret at his departure.

Wishing in a more substantial way to express their appreciation the Rev Gentleman was waited upon on the eve of his departure and presented with a purse containing the sum \$200. The Masonic Lodge of which he is a member also remembered him with a well filled purse.

Mrs Fulton was also presented with a very appreciable address from the ladies of the congregation, accompanied by \$50 in gold, half a dozen sterling spoons and a solid silver sugar shell.

Many friends gathered at the railway station to wish them Godspeed, and with them we wish to join. We believe they will make good in the great west to which they are now bound.

At a meeting of a body of prominent shippers of York, Carleton and Victoria counties held in the town hall, rates were given which is very encouraging to the association. The rate of 8 1/2 to 11 1/2 cts for potatoes going to the West Indies, 17 cts to Montreal, 20 cts to Ottawa and 22 cts to Toronto, the three main shipping points in Canada. The association has and will be the means of getting better facilities from the railroads besides getting the reduction in rates. The potato crop from all appearances is going to be a bumper one this year, fully 40 per cent more than in previous years will be shipped the coming season and all the crops are looking fine at present.

There has been need of just such an organization as this as these three counties will be, not far hence, the main potato country, as much to Canada as Aroostook County is to United States. Let the shippers get together next meeting and carry the plans of the association to a grand climax and no doubt in the future the railroads will offer them still better rates.

Presentations to Rev R G Fulton

On Sunday evening at the close of the service in the Methodist Church, a number of the friends and congregation of Mr Fulton met at his home, and through Mr F B Carvell presented him with a purse of \$200.00. On Monday evening, at a meeting of the Victoria Chapter, Mr D W Kyle on behalf of the masonic brethren presented him with a \$20 gold piece.

Woodstock will certainly put on a gala appearance next week. Red coats galore. It has been a goodly number of years since this town has had so many of our soldiers congregated at this place. It is estimated that fully 500 men will go into camp. Crowds of civilians will assemble at the camp grounds each day to witness the military evolutions. There has been some talk through certain newspapers about cutting down the different regiments below their usual strength. But taking all things into consideration we think that it was a wise plan to have different camps this year. There is really no need of keeping a large standing army in this country as every man throughout our whole broad dominion is at all times in condition to get into trim in case there is need of them. This shows up well for the men of Canada. All that is really necessary is a nucleus of a regiment for men to rally around in case of trouble. Then we think it a wise plan to have each command drill at its headquarters and once in two or three years go into a general camp.

While there is no general staff, Lieut-Col Perkins by virtue of seniority will be camp commandant with Capt A A H Margison, Adj and Orderly Officer. Capt J J Bull will be camp instructor of musketry.

Major and Quartermaster, Harry Carvell with an advance party of three men per company will be on duty Monday looking after the plan of the camps and erecting tents, etc.

Two local companies with 10th Field Battery, Major Good in command, the main body of Brighton Engineers with Centreville and Hartland companies, will arrive on the Plaster Rock train.

The Edmundston and Andover, companies accompanied by the band will arrive here on the 5.45 express and will march to camp.

Everything will be done to make this camp one of the most successful ones ever held. The men's comfort will be looked after by those in charge.

Wouldn't It Jar You.

On the trains which run from Debec Jet to Houlton there is a man dressed in N S uniform cap who requires passengers to declare whether they are American citizens. If the answer is in the affirmative he looks at you as if he didn't believe you. On the question being asked why he demanded to know if they were citizens, he said that if they were not citizens that they must have the required amount of money on their persons or they would not be allowed to enter the United States. Now this is all right if he had the least suspicion that some one who should not be permitted to enter the "sacred precincts" of the U S was trying to get in; but when he puts his face within "smelling" distance of a gentleman, who, to all appearances, has money to "burn" and bawls at him: "Say! do you belong to this country? The gentleman says "no" I am a Canadian citizen and what business is it of yours? To be told that he would have to show the required amount of money or go back as he might become a dependent of the United States. "Wouldn't it jar you."

Shippers Associations of Victoria, Carleton and York Counties.

Under the heading of the above, a name selected by a number of prominent shippers of the counties mentioned held a meeting in the town hall here, last Tuesday night. The meeting being called to order by Mr Coles Dugan, President, Election of officers was gone through with. Mr A D McCain was elected Sect-Treas. Those present were Mr Coles Dugan, Woodstock, Mr A D McCain, Florenceville, J O Munzer, Andover, Guy C Porter, Andover, Jas McIsaac, Florenceville, Mr Perry, Woodstock, and H E McDonald, St John, J F Tweedale, Perth.

The business of the meeting was to find out what rates could be obtained and Mr McDonald agreed to give the Association the rate of 8 1/2 to 11 1/2 per 100 lbs potatoes for export to West Indies. He promised to see that the cars were overhauled and put in condition for the fall business.

The question about heater cars arose but it was found to be impossible to furnish them with any regularity as the Eastman Heater Car Company controls their own cars. A number were in favor of leasing the cars for the season but failed to connect.

Addresses were made by J T Tweedale, M P P, J C Munzer, Guy C Porter, Coles Dugan and H E McDonald relative to the benefit of such an association.

Another meeting is scheduled for July 22 to be held at Florenceville, for the purpose of framing a constitution a committee being appointed to draw up constitution and by-laws, and report at next meeting.

The shippers feel very much encouraged by the way Mr McDonald accepted the propositions made by the Association and what he promises to do for it. A large attendance is requested of the shippers of the three counties at the next meeting when further business will be gone into.
