CHILDREN AS SHOPLIFTERS

Four Youngsters Arrested For Series of Thefts in Vancouver.

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 18.—A shoplifting gang who have been for weeks causing department store managers great worry, is made up of children, the eldest just past 12 years and the youngest five.

Those arrested are: Two McFee girls, aged 12 and 7; a girl named Waterman, aged 12, and a McFee boy aged 5. They all live on Mount Pleasant. They claim that they were first started on a career of crime by older girls, who told them how easy it was to pick up things in stores. For a time they worked for them, getting a share of what they purloined.

Among information issued to the public by the Department of Labor, Ottawa, are some facts relating to the building trade in the year 1908: For example, a total of building operations for that year is reported to the extent of \$51,223,398. This does not cover all the building operations in Canada, but from reporting places and these places cover almost all of the municipal organizations containing five thousand inhabitants, or over. The city of Toronto leads the list of communities reporting. In that place there was an expenditure in the year of \$11,795,436. This was the third successive year in which Toronto was at the top of the column. Vancouver stood second, with an expenditure of \$5,513,106, Winnipeg third, with \$5,513,100, and Montreal fourth, with \$5,062,326.

KILLING OFF THE INDIANS

Confinement in the Reserves is to Blame For High Mortality.

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., June 16.—(Special)—At the Synod of the Diocese of Saskatchewan this afternoon. Venerable Archdeacon McKay, in charge of Indian work in the diocese, said he wished to correct the impression that Indians were dying out. In reality Indians were increasing except among prairie bands, that had to change from the open air, in good leather tents and fresh buffalo meat, to cheap cotton tents on the reserve, where sufficient rations were doled out to them. In due time the Indians would disappear, as did the Saxons, Danes and Normans in England. One third of the Indians in the west belonged to the Anglican Church, due to the church opening the first mission at Pas in 1840.

A commendable example of the pleasing practice, noted in a number of instances recently, of leaving bequests to faithful employees, is that by which 350 employees of a carpet factory at Yonkers, N. Y., receive legacies of \$1,000 each through the will of Mrs. Eva Smith Cochran, who stipulated in her will that the legacy of \$1,000 be given to each employee of the factory who had been working in it for 20 years. It is surprising to find a factory with 350 employees who have worked there for more than 20 years. The incentive to long and faithful labor is plain.

I O R Sunday Trains Out Off

Only Affects Maritime Provinces in Respect to Sentiment.

OTTAWA, June 18.—The recent announcement that there will be no Sunday trains upon the Intercolonial Railway within the Provinces of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island does not according to the railway department, involve any important departure as far as the western end of the government railway is concerned.

The trains will continue to leave Montreal as usual on Sundays, but as they will not cross the boundary of Quebec until after midnight on Sunday they will not offend maritime province sentiment. On the other hand the trains will leave Halifax on Saturday, but will not leave on Sundays, and as they also will be clear of the maritime provinces before Sunday, once more the sentiment of the "Blue Noses" will be respected.

Tot Commits Suicide in Well.

Owensboro, Ky., June 18.—"Mamma, if you whip me I will jump in the well," wailed the five-year old son of Mrs. Samuel Scott, who resides near Central City, when his mother reprimanded him for a childish prank.
