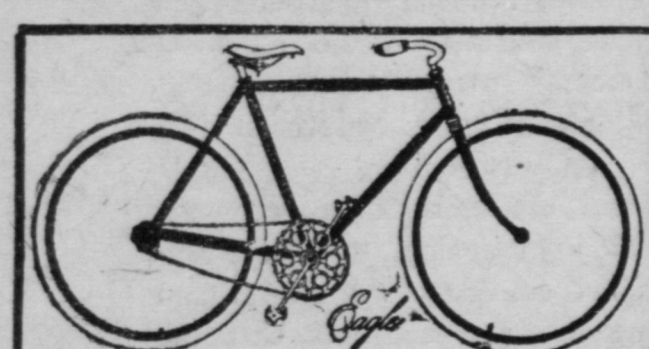

Higher Criticism.

We have not a single copy of any of these books that is an original manuscript. We have only copies of copies, and many of the oldest of these differ from one another in many important details. In the face of these facts it seems absurd for men to wage a wordy war over the serpent that b-guiled Eve or the whale that swallowed Jonah. Does not every Bible student know that there are certain historical facts mentioned in Chronicles and Kings and Samuel that are absolute contradictions of each other? The higher critics take hold of one horn of the dilemma and say these books were only partially inspired. Their opponents take the other stand that these structures were inspired as a means to try our faith and with the monk of old, they say, "I believe this because it is incredible, and I only wish that it were more astounding, as I might thereby have more merit in believing it." More belief, "how-ever," as Holyoake said, "is the easiest, meaneast and shabbiest device by which man ever attempted to scale the walls of Paradise."
