Arbitration Proceedings.

The special board appointed to arbitrate the dispute between the New Brunswick Land Company and the International Railway Company regarding the right of way of the railway through the Land Company's lands met in St. John Tuesday morning. The arbitrators are Henry Hillyard, Hon. Charles E. Oak of Bangor, and Hon. John Costigan. The railway is represented by Messrs F. B. Carvell M. P., and John Stevens, and the land company by Col. H. H. McLean, M. P., and R. R. Taylor. At the first session most of the papers and documents in the case were submitted and the evidence of several witnesses were taken. The case will likely occupy some days and it may be necessary for the arbitrators to take a trip over the line.

The Future Of India.

Prof. Goldwin Smith, in the course of a characteristically illuminating article on "The Crisis in India" in the January Canadian Magazine, concludes: "Some day the end must come. It is impossible that a race should rule forever in a land in which it cannot rear its children. The coming may be hastened by this great movement of the East, of which the initiative may come from Japan. But at present, if military power remains in the hands of the governing race, as it seems likely to do, though there may be, and probably will be, disturbance, it is difficult to see from what quarter revolution can come. Editors of revolutionary journals are not generals, nor will an undisciplined and unarmed populace face the cannon. Native Princes have armies more numerous than efficient, but none of them have shown any disposition to revolt or apparently have as much to gain as they have to lose by revolution. Over the actual crisis at present there is a veil which will presently be raised."

The Valley Again.

Editor Carleton Sentinel;
DEAR SIR.—In a recent edition of the paper appeared an article relative to a petition for the St. John Valley road, of which I heartily approve as far as it goes, but, like a great many other things I have seen in the papers from time to time, such as some inducements to keep our young people in our country, it ends there.

Now I think a railroad would be one of the best means of overcoming the difficulty. Everyone knows that along the proposed route we have as good soil for raising potatoes as there is in the world, but no one can make it pay that spends all day on the road with one load, especially in cold weather, and there is no ship ping point that I know of but that the potatoes houses are full, and the cause is no cars. If we could make two or more trips a day we could easily double the acreage, which would certainly improve the soil and that would by all means double other crops.

Now I have talked with a great many of our best farmers and they are all strongly in favour of a subscription as well as petitions, are willing to subscribe from \$25 to \$100 each providing the road is built in a reasonable time and near the Woodstock and Centreville road and though the amount seems small yet in a thickly settled country like this, it would certainly be quite an item. Take for instance in the Parish of Wilmot at the rate even of \$35 each we would have \$10,000 or more and that through N. B. would be quite a help and then our Governments should grant enough to induce any Company to build it.

And now Mr. Editor I hope this will not end here, we want other men's opinions on this subject.

Our members of Parliament should propose something or get the required papers distributed in the most public places for signatures in the counties through which the road is to be built, we are not asking anything unreasonable, it is what we justly deserve, we see other places flourishing whilst we have to wait, and our Leader says, we have no time to wait.
