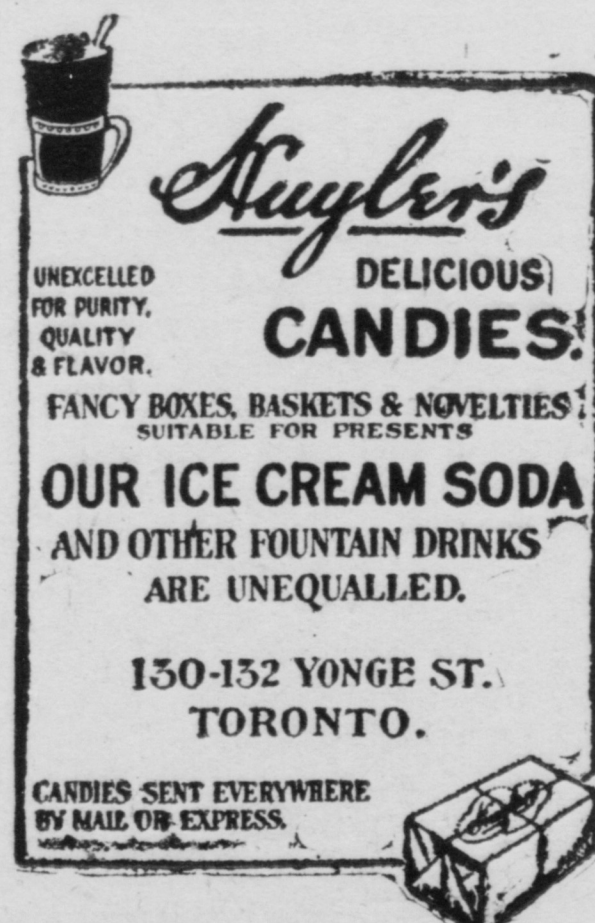

A vote of the ratepayers and of the property holding ratepayers of the Town of Woodstock, N B. will be taken at the Town Council Chamber in the Town Hall at the said Town of Woodstock on Monday the Second day of August next beginning at 10 a.m. and closing at 4 p.m. of same day on the following proposition:—

The guaranteeing by the said Town of the bonds of Messrs J D Dickinson & Sons to an amount equal to fifty per cent of the cost of a Tannery Plant to be erected by them in said Town and in no case shall such guarantee exceed the sum of (\$100,000) Ten Thousand Dollars. The bonds to bear interest at 4½ per cent per annum payable semi-annually and to be retired by J D Dickinson & Sons in five years as follows: \$2500.00 in two years from date of guarantee, and \$2500.00 per year thereafter until the whole issue be retired. Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by a relative, friend, brother, sister or sister-in-law of the homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
