Their daring feats of expert horsemanship arouse the wildest enthusiasm. The women play upon odd musical instruments, and are the most graceful dancers and acrobats this country has ever seen. Upon the elevated stage in the middle of the vast arena of the Norris & Rowe circus, the Stoloff troupe perform a series of strange contortions. The acrobatic feature is mingled with the singing and dancing and while it is all new and strange to this country, it is graceful in the extreme. While the Stoloff Troupe is exhibiting, everything else will come to a standstill, no other act being allowed to interfere with the full picturesqueness of it. The costumes worn by the troupe are wonderfully beautiful. The act will be exhibited here when Norris & Rowe's circus comes to Woodstock, Aug. 26th.

Lumber on the St. John.

New Brunswick lumberman, who are British subjects, have been for many years disposed to regard with disfavor the operation of certain provisions of the Ashburton treaty. These were the provisions which gave to the Americans who owned lumber land on the St. John river in the United States, the right to float their logs down the river and send them into the country of their origin from New Brunswick without paying duty. This privilege was soon enlarged so that the mere sawing of the log was not considered as "manufacturing" in any form, and thus the log sawn into timber could be and was sent back through the port of St. John, entered at United States ports as United States produce and was distributed in the centres which wanted it New Brunswick logs, grown close to the American logs, cut, handled, sent to market in precisely the same way, were subjected to a duty of two dollars a thousand, and the New Brunswick producer regarded this a great hardship to which he was unfairly subject. No doubt it must have operated as a disadvantage to him, for, if he produced his logs and lumber at precisely the same cost as the American producer, he (the New Brunswick) was encumbered by an additional burden of two dollars a thousand which he had to pay the United States tax gatherer to get his goods within reach of the consumer. On the other hand however, the concession which the United States gave to American lumbermen situated as above described, was not without considerable advantage to New Brunswick as a whole, and to St. John particularly. It caused the erection of fine mills at the mouth of this river. It gave employment to many persons. It brought here much trade. It created a carrying trade in lumber to American ports. It caused the consumption in the lumber camps of much farm produce grown in New Brunswick, and the business managers or owners of these American forests and lumber lived here in comfortable circumstances and were excellent citizens as they gave intelligent concern to many matters, were generous in deeds and responsible in all their actions. While the New Brunswick or who produced wood goods from New Brunswick forests was at a disadvantage, the disadvantage merely meant somewhat reduced profits; the province as a whole—or at least the trade of the main river—was materially advanced. In later years changes in the methods of business, the building of railroads in the State of Maine, have considerably altered the course of this business; it is no longer as profitable as it once was, and its volume is reduced largely. Apparently it is to receive a further blow from the new United States tariff. This blow may give satisfaction to the New Brunswick competitor of the American lumberman in this province, but it is calculated to check the manufacture—so far as it is manufacture—of American logs in this province. The new United States tariff act contains this provision:

That the produce of the forests of the State of Maine upon the Saint John river and its tributaries, owned by American citizens and sawed or hewed in the Province of New Brunswick by American citizens, the same being otherwise manufactured in whole or in part, which is now admitted into the ports of the United States free of duty, shall continue for two years after the date of the passage of this act and no longer to be so admitted, under such regulations as the Secretary of the Treasury shall from time to time prescribe.

In terms precisely similar, the lumber from forests along the St. Croix river, owned by Americans is after two years to be similarly treated. Thus the United States government is depriving its own people of a privilege which has been very beneficial to them and to which they seem to be entitled by right of the fact that they are on a boundary river their only outlet by water to the sea. It is surely not in this case revising the tariff downwards.—*St. John Globe.*
