THE EXHIBITION.

Exhibitors Have Already Taken All the Available Space in the Main Building.

Every available inch of space for exhibitors in the main building at the Fredericton 1909 Exhibition from September 14th to 23rd, has been taken up, and the building committee now has to grapple with the question of providing more space as there will doubtless be more applications for space within the next few days.

Entries for the various departments are already coming in at the office of Secretary Hooper, and everything points to a highly successful exhibition. Usually these entries do not start arriving until late in the month of August, and the changed conditions indicate large entry lists in the various stock classes. Next week the newspaper publicity campaign will be on in earnest and just one month from to-day the big fair will be thrown open to the public.

AMERICAN SETTLERS FLOCK TO CANADA.

During Month of June Nearly 12,000 Persons Crossed the Border.

OTTAWA, Aug. 13.—Immigration to Canada is again on the increase and the growth in arrivals from the United States is especially heavy. It was sixty thousand last year, and promises to exceed seventy-five thousand this year. During June, 20,896 persons entered Canada, or 5,933 more than during the previous June, an increase of thirty-three per cent. During the first three months of the fiscal year ending with June, 74,136 persons entered Canada as immigrants, an increase of 5,163, an increase of 7 per cent.

From Great Britain and the continent the arrivals numbered 41,102, a falling off of 7,354 or 15 per cent. During the same time immigrants from the United States numbered 32,924 an increase of 12,517, or 61 per cent. During June alone 11,661 immigrants came in at ocean ports an increase of 909, while during June immigrants from the United States totalled 9,208 an increase of 4,324 or an increase of 89 per cent.

Quick Mails.

Two English mails delivered at the Montreal post office via Canadian liners within a week makes a new record. Thursday of last week the mails which left Liverpool at 6 o'clock on the previous Friday by Empress of Britain were received at the local post office at 7.15 and the mails from the Victorian of the Allan line got to Montreal from Rimouski by train at 9.30. This beats the mails from Liverpool to New York by several hours. It is the quickest time ever made across the Atlantic.

Divorce in Canada.

How divorce has increased in Canada since Confederation the following figures disclose: In 1867-68 one was granted; in '69, one; '70, 71 and '72, none; '73, one; '75, one; '76, one; '77, four; '78, three; '79, one; '84, one; '85, five; '86, one; '87, five; '88, two; '89, four; '90, two; '92, four; '93, seven; '94, six; '95, three; '96, one; '97, one; '98, three; '99, four; 1900, five; '01, two; '02, two; '03, seven; '04, six. The increase then is more noteworthy. In 1905 nine were granted; in 1906, fourteen; 1907, five; 1908, eight, while the last season eclipsed all records with a total of sixteen. The grand total since Confederation is 136.

Nine his Number.

King Edward entered on the ninth year of his reign the 9th of this month. He was born Nov. 9th. He was crowned Aug. 9th, and may he live to be 99. Long live the King.

The Married State—A Priest's Advice.

The idea of "two souls with but a single thought" seems never to have occurred to the Rev. Fr. Bernard Vaughan, S.J. From his standpoint marriage appears to be a union of two hopelessly different individualities and happiness thereto a measure of the success attained by these two persons in putting up with each other. Fr. Vaughan has recently been dealing out advice to the married folk from the point of the Roman Catholic Church in Mayfair, London, and such is the burden of his advertising. Starting from the promise that "men and women are in nothing alike," he said that the first business of a bride and bridegroom was to study each other, making allowance for all those differences which must arise from difference of sex, of education, of taste, "each trying to be satisfied" with what he or she might find in the other. Any high intellectual converse between two persons who "try to be satisfied" with each other is evidently impossible, but Fr. Vaughan recognizes that a woman must talk, and so he says to the husband: "Never attempt to check the flowing tide of her talk. Let her talk on while you possess your soul in peace. Remember that a woman needs many safety valves and outlets for her temperament. Be patient with her." The good wife, on her part, will let her husband do some talking and "never contradict his cherished statement." Thus will quarrels and any exchange of ideas between husband and wife be avoided. Fr. Vaughan seems to think it a beautiful arrangement, and the London newspapers state that many persons stood throughout the service to hear his words of wisdom.

How to Test Dress Goods.

Of the goods sold as "all wool" there is not one-tenth that is genuine. Generally the main component is cotton. The test for this is simple. All that is necessary is to dull out a few threads and apply a lighted match. Cotton will go off in a blaze; wool will shrivel up. To distinguish pure linen from counterfeit is even easier. The intended buyer need not wet her finger and apply it to the goods. If they are pure linen, the moisture will pass straight through. The spot touched will be soaked at once, and almost immediately one-sided will be as wet as the other. Frauds are more numerous in silk than in any other fabric but here also the material of adulteration is cotton. Its presence can readily be discovered. Draw a few threads out. The pieces of cotton will snap off short when pulled, while the silk will stretch and permit a considerable pull before breaking.

M. S. Sutton, Prominent Merchant of Andover Dead.

The sudden death of M. S. Sutton occurred at his home, Sunday morning at 9 o'clock. He had been ill only a few weeks suffering from a complication of diseases which defied the skill of the best physicians. The deceased was doing a large hardware business at Andover and was one of the traders of Victoria County. He leaves a wife, and two children. He was thirty-six years of age. The Masons of which he was a member took charge of the remains and buried him with Masonic honors at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon in the Baptist burying ground.
