PROVINCIAL SANITARIUM

Society for the Prevention and Spread of Tuberculosis to be Organized.

A meeting was held at 8 o'clock on Thursday evening in the Council Chamber for the purpose of organizing a society for the prevention and spread of tuberculosis. Colonel F. H. J. Dibblee was in the chair and E. W. Mair acted as secretary.

Dr Rankin was heard and stated object of meeting was for the purpose of organizing this as a branch of the Dominion Society. He suggested calling a public meeting first; second the bringing of the matter to the attention of the school children by the means of instructions, etc.

Mr Meagher was heard regarding what was being done in Charlotte County and read the pamphlets distributed through the schools. He then moved, seconded by Dr Rankin, that the secretary have type written copies made of these pamphlets for use in work of this Society. Carried.

Father McMurray was heard suggesting that a public meeting be called and widely advertised and the town first organized.

Rev H. G. Kennedy and Sheriff Tompkins were also heard in favor of the movement.

Moved by Dr Rankin, seconded by Dr Grant, that the chairman and secretary be empowered to call a public meeting and arrange for speakers, etc., to be called when committee deem advisable.

Dr Rankin said that there was no sanitarium in this province to which our people could go—they must go but they could not get admittance. It was the only province in the Dominion that had no such institution. The majority of the sick people cannot afford to go to Saranac Lake. If they can go to a place where they can be treated for about \$5 a week, which would be within their means, many of these now ill can be cured. The government had appointed a committee to look into the matter and select a site; two sites had been offered the committee without charge; the committee would report to the government at next session. Several public meetings would be of great assistance to impress upon the government the urgent need of the sanitarium.
