## SHIPPERS MEETING.

A meeting has been called by the shippers and dealers who are interested in the opening up of a new Market for the Farmers of the Province and all interested are requested to be present. Meeting to take place at Woodstock, July 22nd, Thursday at one o'clock. A meeting will probably be held later in St John where dealers from every section of the Province could be heard and the question of transportation gone into more fully. A committee of the Council, consisting of the Provincial Sect. and Commissioner of Agriculture was appointed to confer with the dealers and ascertain what steps might be taken to promote the interest of this very necessary project.

## Synopsis of Canadian North-west Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$2.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homesteaded entry (including the required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$20.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
