

FIVE THOUSAND OPERA TIVES IDLE.

Weavers Inaugurate Strike in Big Fall River Mills.

Fall River, Mass., Sept. 14.—The entire plant of the Fall River Iron Works, controlled by M. C. D. Borden of New York, which was shut down Monday, following a strike of the weavers, remained closed today and the 5000 operatives will continue in idleness.

The Iron Works plant comprises seven mills and is the largest concentrated cotton manufacturing plant in the world owned by a single individual. The weavers, numbering 1000, went out on strike to enforce their demand for an increase of about 10 per cent in wages, and their absence so hampered the other departments that the management decided to close the whole plant.

The prospects of trade with Cuba are reported very bright. Orders have already been booked for considerable shipments of potatoes. The greatest care should be taken to ship only produce of high quality, and to make a favorable impression at the outset. Eagerness to exploit a market sometimes spoils it. The proper way to ship potatoes for the Cuban Trade is in barrels says Dr. Kirkpatrick, Canadian Trade Commissioner, in Cuba. Right here in Woodstock, which is the centre for shippers of the country, are manufactured excellent barrels for just such purposes. Shippers should bear this in mind when they buy barrels, they ought to patronize home industries. The shipper can do the barrel home, grade his own potatoes and can stand by for every barrel being first quality, whereas if they were sent to St. John for grading they could not do so.

CANADA'S CROP FAR IN EXCESS OF FORMER YEARS

Supplementary Report Issued By Department At Ottawa Shows Remarkable Increase In Yield.

Ottawa, Sept. 12.—A supplementary crop bulletin issued by the census and statistics branch shows that as compared with last year Canada's crop yield shows a remarkable increase. Of wheat it is estimated that Canadian farmers will have for sale over 43,000,000 bushels more than last year. This year's crop estimates are over 168,000,000 bushels. The oat crop is estimated at 254,919,000, an increase of over 84,000,000 bushels. There is also an increase of over 7,000,000 bushels in the production of barley. The only province which does not show a substantial increase in the yield of wheat, oats and barley is Ontario. It is estimated that the wheat crop of the west will exceed last year's crop by 45,000,000 bushels. There is a big decrease in the production of hay and clover. The crop should be worth from fifty to sixty million dollars more to the Canadian farmer than that harvesting in 1908. Comparing the cereal crops of wheat, oats and barley with the estimate made for the same date last year, the totals of wheat in the Maritime provinces are 1,300,000 against 1,179,000 bushels, of oats 17,228,000, against 16,888,000 bushels and of barley 496,000 against 497, bushels.


