## A Word to the Liberals of Carleton County.

The persistency with which the Conservatives are following up the protest case leads one to ask regarding the coalition government which Mr Hazen is supposed to lead at Fredericton. When after the election of March, 1909, Mr Hazen was sent into power it was acknowledged that he had been voted into power by Liberal ballots. A strong Liberal from the North Shore became a member of the Cabinet and the Moncton platform seemed to be a thing of the past in the statements of Mr Hazen and his followers concerning a government which would represent the people.

In Carleton County it is well known that the large majority of Flemming, Smith and Munro was the result of Liberal ballots cast for them under the impression that it was to produce equal rights, coalition and above all better roads.

But what has been the result. What treatment have the Liberals, who so generally forgot their party and friends, received from the hands of the local government. On every hand they have been ousted from office, they have been turned down in any application they have made for work and in general have been told that this coalition government which they helped elect was no coalition government at all but simply conservative and what was more "none but conservatives need apply."

Using his prestige as leader of the local government Mr Hazen practically took charge of the campaign for the conservative party in the Federal election which followed. But by so doing he disclosed himself and the result of the Federal election which sent eleven liberal members to Ottawa out of a possible thirteen showed Mr Hazen what New Brunswick really thought of him when he appealed to them from a party platform.

In Carleton County it was the leading followers of Mr Hazen who fought most bitterly against Mr Carvell. Kidd Flemming, Smith, Munro and some lesser lights of the conservative party were out day and night and every day in the week in a vain effort to defeat Mr Carvell. And these were the men who only a few months previous were asking liberals to vote for them as representative of a coalition government. And to make matters worse, as the article on the front page of this issue with figures to prove shows, these men "borrowed" all the money it was possible to get their hands on from this so called coalition government, to use in aiding them in their effort to defeat Mr Carvell.

And now the full strength of their venomous nature is being shown by the continued attack on Mr Upham. Let us just here comfort these untiring enemies with the prophecy that Mr Upham will remain in the House just as long as the great Mr Hazen and much longer than the blundering Flemming or the docile, tractable Munro. But let the liberals of Carleton County see the nature of those who pulled the sheep skin over their eyes in March, 1908. See the bitter Tory nature in its narrowness and lasting hatred of anything that even resembles liberal success.

And what has been the nature of the treatment accorded the liberals

of the county by these men of Hazen. Is it not true that everywhere that it has been possible Liberals have been put out of office without any other reason than that some Conservative wanted the position. Have the roads improved any under the new road act. Every one who drives in the country knows that roads and bridges of this county have never been worse than they are this spring. Let the liberals of Carleton County take these matters into consideration.

The Press, quoting Dr Landry, speaks of Mr Upham's election as a premature birth. No doubt many conservatives looked upon it in the same way, considering that only a few months previous Flemming, Smith and Munro had been elected with what appeared like an insurmountable majority; to have that majority turned down and defeat administered right in the county of the Prov Secretary it certainly did look a little premature. But when a party adopts the tactics which the Conservative party has adopted in this county no defeat ought to seem premature to them. The election of Mr Upham was not the result of premature conclusions on the part of the electors of this county. It does not take the decent thinking people long to see through the flim-flam game the Tories have played. And when they turned the Tory majority of March into a liberal majority for Mr Upham they were not premature as Dr Landry or the Press evidently thinks but simply entered their protest against being used as tools a second time. But one of the things which worried the Hazen party most was the remarkable strength of this "premature birth." Why is the Tory party so anxious to shut Mr Upham out. Is it that he gained this election as the conservatives claim or that his aggressive work worried his opponents. No doubt many times through the session they wished he was in Cold Storage or some other place. But we think that before they get through with him they will seek Cold Storage themselves or some other place equally as sheltered.

## An Apology Due The Provincial Secretary.

From recent information we are rather inclined to think an apology is due Kidd Flemming, for thinking there was any connection between that ride to Montreal in Sir William Van Horn's private car and the "turn down" administered by him to the Valley Railroad project.

After suffering untold agonies over the unkind remarks made by the newspapers, and after having been publicly called upon to resign by his party friends, he has at last given the real reason for his otherwise unexplainable conduct.

It seems the Canadian Pacific Railway Co gives him a pass over their railway lines and, by a recent law of the State of Maine, passes are unlawful and the Company dare not pass even Mr Flemming from Vanceboro to Megantic, the fare between these points being \$5.25 and by accepting Mr Van Horn's kind invitation to ride in his car Mr Flemming was able to save the Province this large amount, and, no doubt due credit will be found in next year's Auditor General's Report. It is very unfortunate he did not furnish this important information to the Legislature immediately after the trip.

## The Protest.

The Hon Mr Flemming has recently stated that they are again bringing on the protest against Mr Upham, not for the purpose of capturing the seat, but for the purpose of enforcing purity in elections in this County.

This is certainly very refreshing coming from the man who was responsible for blocking the purity agreement in March last and who, when challenged at Peel not long ago, on the ground of bribing voters on that day, dare not take the oath and was unable to vote at the election then being held.

## Protest Case in Supreme Court.

In the case of W J Owens, petitioner against Geo W Upham, the Carleton county election case, Mr W P Jones, K O, moved for a rule nisi returnable some day this term calling upon the petitioner to show cause why an order made by Mr Justice McLeod, setting the case down for hearing on Tuesday, August 17th next, should not be vacated and set aside. Mr Jones supported his rule on three grounds: 1st, that publication was not sufficient; 2nd, that there was no posting of a copy of the petition in the registry office in Car Co as required by law and 3rd, that even if posted on the 27th January in the registry office, as is alleged by the petitioner, that the publication was too late. Mr Jones occupied nearly the entire morning in reading affidavits and arguing in support of his rule. Court granted the rule nisi returnable on the second Friday in the term. Another rule, returnable the same date, was granted in the question of the extension of time for the trial of the petition.

## Contract Awarded.

The contract for building the court house was awarded by the building committee Friday to R A Corbett, St John, for \$21,930, which includes repairs to the record office. The other tenders were as follows: B F Smith, at Florenceville, \$32,880; Fred Ryan, Fredericton, \$32,625; Smalley and Post Woodstock, \$25,000; John Flood, St John, \$25,000; Jos McVay & Son, St Stephen, \$23,650; Burley & Ruddick, St John \$22,765. From several applicants Richard L Allingham was appointed inspector.

A crew of men in charge of John Edgett are at work on the county lot excavating for the foundation of the new court house. The sides and back walls will be of concrete and the front wall of granite blocks to match the record office.

J E Wilson of St John, has the contract for supplying the iron, steel and galvanized material for the building.

## Todd C Brewer Missing.

Todd C Brewer, bridge builder, has been missing since Monday night, and the general belief is that he has been drowned. Mr Brewer was in Fredericton on Monday evening, and had luncheon at a restaurant there, leaving about eleven o'clock. He has not been seen since, and on Tuesday morning an Indian found his coat and hat on a raft of logs out from the St Mary's shore and immediately above the Fredericton St Mary's highway bridge. A continuous search has been made since then for the body, but so far the efforts have been unsuccessful.

Mr Brewer is a son of Mr Albert Brewer, contractor, formerly of Woodstock, now of St Mary's having moved there just a few weeks ago.

## Board of Trade Meeting.

At a meeting of the Board of Trade, held in the Town Hall Monday evening, the following resolution was unanimously carried:—That this Board of Trade takes the present opportunity to place on record the sense of the loss it has sustained in the death of one of its most valued and faithful members, Clare J Tabor, Esquire, proprietor of the Carlisle Hotel. Ever since his coming to Woodstock, Mr Tabor was a member of the Board and a constant attendant at its meetings. He was interested in everything connected with the town of which he was a citizen, and recognized the advantage of these meetings of the business men of the place. He was particularly interested in the project of the construction of the St John Valley Railway, and was a delegate to Fredericton the last time the delegation waited upon the Government. His loss will be keenly felt for a long time, and the Board of Trade in particular, and the Town of Woodstock in general has lost in Mr Tabor's early removal by death, a valuable and public spirited citizen.

President Dibblee reported that he had heard nothing from Vice President McNichol regarding Woodstock as a divisional point. There was considerable discussion as to the dirty condition of the streets of our town, and the Board thought every citizen should be induced to take an interest, and if they did not do so, the bye-law relating to this nuisance should be enforced.

## Farmers' Telephone Company.

The Farmers' Telephone Co., Ltd., commenced work last week on their line from Hartland to Woodstock and intend rushing the work so that the line will be in operation before the last of July. They have the poles up now below Wm McGee's, in Lower Brighton about three miles from Hartland. The wire will be strung and the phones placed in the houses, as fast as the poles are erected. This Company is composed of good reliable men, residing principally in the parishes of Brighton and Aberdeen. A charter was secured in 1906 and a line of 18 miles in length, from Hartland to South Knowlesville was built during that year. The next year the line was extended on to Knowlesville, a first class metallic line, equipped with the best telephones that money can buy was installed. At the end of the second year some 34 miles of line were in operation with an up-to-date switch in Hartland and upwards of 60 instruments in use. Most of the business men of Hartland are on this line, each of the resident doctors having a private wire. The success that the Company has met with, and the solicitation from the patrons of the system, and from the residents through Lower Brighton and Pembroke for connection with the shiretown of the county, induced the Company to extend on to Woodstock and upon a canvass being made sufficient stock was subscribed to warrant them to build the line. The stock of the company is owned principally by patrons of the line and they virtually control the business of the company.

They have had a satisfactory service so far and also have received a good dividend each year on the amount of money invested. Mr Geo Brittan of Windsor is the President of the company, and is the managing director, and will superintend building of this line and installing of the telephones. Mr Brittan has made a study of this business since the inception of the company and has become well posted in the telephone business, and the stockholder can rest assured that the work will be well done and at a minimum expense. Mr Jesse E Tedford of Windsor is the Secretary Treas of the Company. The head office of the company is at Windsor. This will probably be changed either to Hartland or Woodstock as the list of stockholders becomes spread over the country.
