THOROUGHbred STALLIONS IMPORTED BY GOVERNMENT.

FREDERICTON, N. B.—The Department of Agriculture is having a number of thoroughbred stallions placed in the province, and perhaps the most noted horses that ever came to Canada are those now being sent by the National Bureau of Breeding at Montreal to this province at the instance of the department. The first draught reached the province yesterday via the I.C.R., and includes the noted stallions Logan, Astrich and Javlin. The last named was left off at Bathurst in charge of A. J. H. Stewart, of that town, to meet the wishes of breeders of Restigouche and Gloucester counties. The other two will arrive in Fredericton this evening. Astrich is going forward to Scott Shaw, of Victoria Corner, Carleton County, and Logan is going to St. Stephen parties. Javlin is a magnificent brown horse of great substance by imported Bridgewater, out of the Ghost, by Flying Dutchman. He is four years old, a perfect thoroughbred, bred in the purple. Javlin was presented to the National Bureau of Breeding by Mr. Thomas Clyde, of Maryland, who selected him as an ideal type of thoroughbred to mate with farm mares. At the Montreal horse show the week before last Javlin was greatly admired. He was placed third to Rose Mount and Astrich in the bureau class, and third to Rose Mount and Dublin in the open class, beating such excellent stallions as Masterman, Bushmount and Floral King.

Ostrich, the royally bred son of Order, by the great Derby winner Ben D'Or, out of Plumage, combines blood lines that have always produced winners. He is now eight years old and stands sixteen hands one.

Logan, the third of this noted trio, is perhaps the most noted horse in America. The "Iron Horse," as he has been familiarly known throughout the United States, belonged to the late Alexander Shields and has won more races than any other horse in America. Logan is by Voltaire, by Vandal, two of the most noted thoroughbreds of their time.

It is expected that at least two other stallions will be obtained for the province, and it is hoped to secure the beautiful chestnut Isafel, by Meddler, one of the most superbly beautiful strains of this noble breed.

At the time of the Montreal Horse Show Colonel F. H. Dibblee of Woodstock, Colonel H. M. Campbell of Sussex and W. W. Hubbard, secretary of the Agricultural Commission went to Montreal to look over the bureau stallions and the horses now arriving are those which this committee highly approved.—Globe.

Tree Planting.

The following pointers may be useful to people who are intending to set out fruit trees: (1) The trees should not be allowed to become dry before planting. (2) The ragged ends or bruised parts of the roots should be carefully cut off before planting. (3) The hole should be made large and deep. A small mound of good soil should then be made in the hole directly under where the trunk of the tree will be placed, so that when the roots are spread out they will be in a position similar to that they occupied in the nursery. (4) The tree when planted should be about two inches deeper than it was in the nursery. (5) Good soil should be worked in among the roots and packed over the roots. (6) Trees should not be planted when the soil is in a wet and sticky condition.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homesteaded entry (including the required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
