The lumber merchants, we are  
told, have unanimously assured the  
surveyor general that they use the

are not of the same mind. The man

boys, and a few hands from the  
neighborhood, will have to buy saws  
and employ an expert filer to keep  
the saws in order. The large opera-  
tors will not mind this expense,  
but it will be a burden to the small  
operator.

The unanimous vote of thanks given  
by the lumber merchants to Survey-  
or General Grimmer, not for grant-  
ing their petition but for having at-  
tended their meetings, shows that  
the "lords" have become so meek  
and humble that they are thankful  
for very small favors. The hint that  
individual cases of hardship should  
by the regulations would be attend-  
ed to in a fatherly spirit, was not  
lost on them.

#### THE GRAIN AND ROOT CROPS OF CANADA.

Report for 30 September 1909.

Ottawa October 11. Quality is the  
feature of the field crops of Canada  
as indicated by the reports of cor-  
respondents of the Census and Sta-  
tistics Office at the end of September.  
Compared with reports at the same  
date last year, the average quality  
of spring wheat is 82.58 to 75 per cent  
of a standard, of oats 83.97 to 75, of  
barley 81.22 to 71, of rye 81.29 to 73,  
of peas 81.34 to 63, of beans 82.32 to  
75, of buckwheat 86.01 to 74, of mixed  
grains 89.28 to 75, of flax 86.97 to 68  
and of corn for husking 86.77 to 82.

In the Northwest provinces, where  
bulk of the field grain is produced,  
the average of quality are uniformly  
high. Compared with last year,  
spring wheat in Manitoba is 87.28 to  
81 per cent of a standard, oats 86.07  
to 73 and barley 85.39 to 68. In Sas-  
katchewan wheat is 92.95 to 61, oats  
94.01 to 67 and barley 91.23 to 58. In  
Alberta spring wheat is 89.05 to 77,  
oats 90.20 to 84 and barley 84.18 to 80.  
These high qualities applied to an  
output of 350,000,000 bushels at the  
highest market prices realized in a  
quarter of a century are an indica-  
tion of the country's fortune reaped  
from the prairies this year. But in  
all the provinces as well as in the  
Northwest the records of grain crops  
are satisfactory, and the September  
weather has been very favourable  
for threshing operations.

The condition of potatoes and root  
crops is nearly the same as at the  
end of August. The report of pota-  
toes is 90.37 per cent, of turnips 83-  
34, of mangolds, carrots etc., 84.40,  
of corn for fodder 87.18 and of sugar  
beets 71.02.

Rust, the joint worm and hail  
storms did some injury in parts of  
Prince Edward Island; drought re-  
tarded plant growth in the Annapolis  
valley of Nova Scotia; heavy rains  
caught the grain of New Brunswick  
in the stock; and early frosts and  
grasshoppers have lowered the  
averages of oats and barley in Que-  
bec. But loss from these causes will  
not be seriously felt anywhere. The  
reports for Ontario are better than  
those for the end of August, and ex-  
cept for a plague of grasshoppers in  
the regions adjoining Lake Huron  
and Georgian Bay and an unusual  
visitation of frost in the corn-grow-  
ing counties of the south, the far-  
mers of this province have had a  
good year. The hot and drying  
winds in the last ripening days of  
late-sown wheat in the Northwest  
provinces have probably lowered  
the average yield there, but corres-  
pondents hesitate yet to make an es-  
timate on the extent of it.

The final report on the field crops  
in all the provinces will be given in  
the December Monthly.

The famous comet known as Hal-  
ley's, which terrified Europe in 1946,  
will, next spring, pass close enough  
to the earth to be seen in all its  
glory. At the present moment the  
earth and the comet are rushing to-  
wards one another at a tremendous  
pace in their several orbits, and  
rapidly reducing the four hundred  
millions of miles which separated  
them a short time ago. There is,  
however, no danger of a collision, as  
we shall pass in October the spot at  
which the comet will arrive at the  
end of next March. By May and  
June next year we shall have got  
around to the other side of the sun,  
and the comet, which will then be  
turning in its path into space, will  
be at its nearest to us. But again  
we shall be in front of it, and when  
it crosses our orbit for the second  
time we shall be steadily leaving it  
behind us. Its last appearance was  
in 1835, for it has a period of about  
75 years. Halley's Comet was so  
called not because he discovered it,  
but because he was the first to cal-  
culate its orbit and predict its re-  
turn.
