All Canadian Graves Are Marked.

All the graves of Canadians who fell in the South African war have been suitably marked, and the South African Memorial Association, which was organized for this purpose, in making this announcement, ceases to exist. In this final report the association states that it collected \$14,269 for the purpose of locating and marking the graves of fallen Canadians. There were 264 Canadian victims of the South African war, 230 being buried in Africa, 11 at sea, and 5 in England.

A hundred and eighty stones were erected, some at Paardeberg and Hart's River being of large dimensions, to indicate the resting place of many soldiers, that at Paardeberg bearing 17 names. Each grave has been photographed, and copies sent to the next of kin. All the graves have been marked with coping stones, guarded by substantial iron railings, and at Paardeberg and Hart's River trees have been planted around the cemeteries. After all expenses had been met, there remained a balance of \$4,868, which was handed over to the Loyal Women's Guild of South Africa, which has undertaken to care for the graves.

NOVA SCOTIA VESSEL OWNERS GET DAMAGES FROM SAN DOMINGO.

Craft Was Struck by Fire of Troops During One of the Revolutions.

Ottawa, Oct. 17.—The dominion government after long negotiations through the British foreign office with the government of San Domingo has succeeded in having payment for damages received by a Nova Scotia schooner, the Britannia, during one of the periodical revolutions in the island. The schooner was damaged by the fire of Dominican troops on land and a claim for compensation was taken up by the government here. A cheque for \$1,044 has now been received from San Domingo and has been forwarded to owners of the schooner E. A. O'Brien & Co., of Noel (N.S.).

Johnson Wins Fight in Twentieth Round.

San Francisco, Oct. 16.—Jack Johnson today retained the heavy weight championship by knocking out Stanley Ketchell in the twelfth round of their fight at Colma. The end came so suddenly that when Ketchell rolled on the floor and Referee Welsh counted him out, the 10,000 persons crowding the arena were absolutely quiet for a full minute. Even Johnson, who leaned against the ropes half dazed by his own fall a moment before, did not seem to know what had happened.

The climax of the fight was crowded into 34 seconds. At the beginning of what proved to be the last round there had been little in the preceding rounds on which to forecast the winner. The men in the centre of the ring clinched and wrestled to Johnson's corner. The negro broke away and, poling himself, dashed at Ketchell, who sprang to meet him. Ketchell, drove his right at the black's lowered head. Johnson ducked and the blow landed behind his ear. He stumbled, fell, and stretched out on the floor, landing heavily. Ketchell backed toward the ropes with a faint smile on his battered, bloodstreamed face. Johnson rose slowly as though bewildered.

LIKE A WILD BEAST

As he straightened to his knees he looked at Ketchell, and like a wild beast he leaped across the ten foot that parted. His right fist shot to the white man's jaw. His left landed on his stomach and his right swung again with the speed of lightning, catching Ketchell's head as he reeled back from the onslaught.

Ketchell dropped in a heap and Johnson, unable to stop his rush, sprawled across his beaten rival's legs and fell full length himself.

The negro sprang to his feet with a bound, but Ketchell was out. Johnson was still dazed. He clung to the ropes and looked about him in a wondering way. The crowd broke into murmuring and seemed to realize that the fight was over.

Ketchell won many friends by his showing today. From the time he entered the ring until he was carried out he was game to the core. Outweighed, over half reached and in every way the physical inferior of his gigantic opponent, he fought a cool, well-planned, gritty fight. His face was puffed and he was bleeding at the nose and mouth before three rounds had passed, but he kept following the negro about the ring undaunted.

Johnson appeared to be holding himself in reserve at the time.

HIS GOLDEN SMILE.

Throughout the fight Johnson's "golden smile" flashed out at intervals over Ketchell's shoulder in the midst of their wrestling bouts. This happened whenever he picked the smaller man off the ground and set him down again in another place. He did it frequently and apparently without effort.

Ketchell fought warily from the start. He kept at long range, avoiding many blows by clever ducking, but Johnson jabbed his left into Ketchell's face time after time. When they clinched Johnson towered inches above Ketchell.

Twice Ketchell was thrown to the floor by the rush of Johnson's attack. Neither time did a blow land. On other times Ketchell avoided the charges by skipping nimbly to right or left or backing swiftly away.

They sparred for openings for long periods and there was little real fighting throughout the early rounds.

Round 12—Ketchell suddenly rushing in sent his right. It struck the champion on the jaw and the big negro fell flat upon his back and seemed to have injured himself. Ketchell rushed right at him, but the tricky champion was waiting for him. He swung a hard right to the jaw, and quick as a flash sent a left to the body. As Ketchell fell backward Johnson sent in another right to the face, and the white went to the floor, with blood streaming from his mouth. He made a weak effort to rise, but fell back again and was counted out.

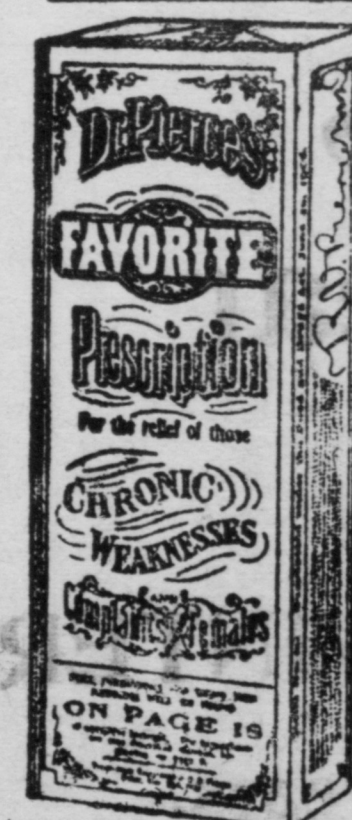
