A Visit to Portsmouth Dock- yards.

Few aspects of the naval crisis have
been so alarming to many people as
the question of Great Britain's build-
ing capacity. A visit to Portsmouth
Dockyard would reassure shaken
nerves.

Though now by far the most impor-
tant of Britain's naval dockyards,
Portsmouth, though from time im-
memorial a naval port, was for a
long period only in the second place.
Portchester Castle, at the head of the
harbor, was the Roman and Saxon
naval headquarters in the Channel,
and in mediaeval times more than
one naval expedition was fitted out
at Portsmouth. Henry VII was the
first king to construct a dry dock
there, which was built under the
superintendence of Robert Brygan-
dine, the clerk of the ships, in 1495,
and it is said to be the first ever
made in England. It took forty-six
weeks to build and cost no less than
£193 0s 6d, a big sum for those days.
The four-masted overcrown was the
first ship built in it and was a con-
siderable advance upon her prede-
cessors. Henry VII, made the dock-
yard a royal establishment, and from
this period its development can be
clearly traced. The entrance to the
dock in those days was closed at will
by "a mighty chain of iron," some
links of which are still to be seen.

THE ADDITIONS.

For more than two centuries the
dockyard was not more than eight
acres in extent. Then two acres were
added. Charles II added eighteen,
but even in the reign of George III,
it did not exceed ninety five acres.
In the course of the eighteenth cen-
tury, Portsmouth Dockyard was once
practically destroyed by fire, and
1770 narrowly escaped another con-
flagration, thanks to the attempt at
incendiaryism by a malcontent Scot-
sman, James Hill by name, but better
known to fame as "Jack the Painter."
He had lived for a time in America,
where he had imbibed a great hatred
for Britain, and was employed by
some of Britain's numerous foreign
enemies to set fire to the dockyards
with a view of destroying our naval
supremacy. He succeeded in start-
ing a fire and in escaping from Port-
smouth Dockyard, but the fire was
put out in time, and "Jack the Paint-
er" was captured in London and
hanged outside the dockyard gates
on the mizen-mast of the Archæus.

THE MODERN YARD.

The modern yard may be said to
date from 1843, when it was deter-
mined to greatly enlarge it and in-
troduce steam power. In 1846 it was
still further enlarged, and now covers
between 300 and 400 acres of ground
with its basins, docks, building slips,
factories, storehouses and work-
shops. Here are fine drawing offices,
machinery for punching, bend-
ing, cutting, and shaping steel plates
all of which operations, thanks to
the powers conferred by steam hy-
draulics, and electricity, they ap-
pear to carry out with no more dif-
ficulty than if they had been dealing
with butter or plasticine. In the
large smithy, a huge brick building,
there are no fewer than 120 fires ar-
ranged in a quadrangle.

Of the enormous steam hammers
invented by James Nasmyth, there
are a full dozen, one at any rate
weighing no less than seven tons.
Portsmouth yard boasts as many as
seventeen drydocks of various sizes
and importance. One or two of
these can take a Dreadnought, and
seven King Edwards or Nelsons.
There are three large basins, and
the smaller steam basin. The large-
est of these is 1,000 feet in length and
the next smaller 900 feet. Around
the basins are numerous shears and
cranes for lifting guns, armour
plates, portions of engines, and other
heavy material in and out of ships
as they lie alongside the basin walls.
They are worked by hydraulic or
steam power, and the largest pair of
shears is capable of raising a weight
of 160 tons. But we have by no
means exhausted the tale of the
various establishments which have
habitat within the long encircled
walls of Portsmouth Dockyard. Be-
sides the work-shops already enu-
merated there are the rope, mast and
block-making houses, the boat build-
ing shed, the stores of gun mount-
ings, cables and the long rows of
ships' anchors forming a perfect
alleyway of iron. Neither must the
coal yards be overlooked with their
mountains of black diamonds sur-
rounded by rows and rows of cranes
and derricks for filling ships' bunk-
ers and railway trucks. Then there
are the fine houses occupied by the
Commander-in-Chief and the Ad-
miral Superintendent, with their
gardens and the terrace of houses in
which other and lesser functionaries
have their abode. Here, too, is the
establishment in which naval and
marine officers spend months of study
in various war courses, dealing with
the higher phases of naval strategy
and tactics, and also the navigation
school and the big fire station con-
taining five steam fire engines, nine
manuals, two fire escapes, and
twenty-five hose reels.

Portsmouth Dockyard affords em-
ployment for 8,000 to 8,500 men, who
are to be seen streaming in armies
in and out of the Main, Marlborough
and Unicorn gates when the bell
rings for them to begin or leave work,
their wages bill totalling £11,000 to
£12,000 a week.
