Mr Hazen's Surrender.

The whole province is laughing at the prompt manner in which Mr Hazen and his government have climbed down from their perch with respect to the great highway act, which was going to do such great things for this province, which indeed according to the Premier, his colleagues and supporters in the legislature, was one of the most wonderful thorough going reforms ever put upon the statute books of this or any other country.

So thirty were the people of New Brunswick for a new highway act so vicious was the old act, according to Mr Hazen, that the new law must take its place at once, so that the people might have decent roads.

The legislature was scarcely open last session, the governor's speech had just been delivered, when Mr Hazen jumped to his feet and introduced his new highway act, which was to work such a mighty change in conditions in this province. It was in redemption of his pre-election pledges, and Mr Hazen according to his friends, did not propose to disappoint those who had pinned their faith to the pretty stories he had told during the election campaign.

A few days later Mr Hazen explained the provisions of the highway bill, and he gave the House and the country to understand that in a few months, before the year closed indeed the bill would become law. All that was wanted was the municipal elections over. These would all be completed in October, and immediately the new law would come into operation. (See page 35 official debates of 1908) Later when the bill was under discussion in committee, it was agreed that it should be proclaimed as law on January 1st, 1909.

So far, so good, but how have Mr Hazen's pledges been carried out. The year 1908 has gone, and we have passed Jan 1, 1909, and the alleged hasty highway act of Mr Hazen's predecessors is still in force. At the recent session of the government it was decided that the new act should not be proclaimed for the present. Mr Hazen says he wants to hear from the municipal councils before he brings the act into operation although the legislature at Mr Hazen's bidding decreed that the new law should come into force Jan. 1st, 1909, and it was represented that the country could not do without it an hour longer.

What balderdash. Why does not Mr Hazen admit that he is afraid to bring his law into force?

Why does he not confess that the unpopularity of many of its provisions has forced him to stay his hand.

Why is he not honest enough to confess that his road act has been condemned by the people of two counties where bye-elections have been held, and that he dare not proclaim the law as at present constituted. A more abject surrender to political exigencies, has never been witnessed in this province, and it is no wonder that the people point to it as one more of Mr Hazen's numerous blunders during the few months he has been at the head of the government.

Mr Hazen wants to hear from the municipal councils does he? He is looking for a road law policy the same as his commissioner for agriculture looking for an agricultural policy. He and his colleagues are afraid to move in such important public matters without feeling their way. They are like children in the dark, afraid of goblins that might eat them up—powerless to inaugurate a bold and promising policy on any great public question. They lack the capacity for constructive statesmanship as they have lamentably failed in administering the ordinary affairs of the province, and the people who witness their exhibitions, are ready to hurl them from power and give their place to men who will have the courage and the ability to grapple successfully with the question of provincial politics.—Herald.

Letter from Provincial Secretary.

The following is a copy of a letter which has been sent to every County Councillor:—

Hartland, N B Dec. 30, 1908

Dear Sir,—The County Council meets on the 12th of January. The Chief Commissioner of Public Works has mailed a copy of the New Highway Act to each councillor and a letter to the Secy.—Treas., of each county asking that the Council give the Act some consideration at their January meeting. I look upon this as very important because of the fact that under the Act the councillors are practically put in control of all the moneys raised by the people for road purposes and also a large sum of money supplemented to the above amount from the Provincial Treasury. The appointing of all the officials, the locating of where the money shall be spent in each parish, and a great many other things devolves upon the Highway Board of the parish of which the two councillors are always a majority. As was intimated at the last session of the legislature we wish to get the opinions of the people most directly interested as to any amendments they feel should be made to the Act passed at the last session of the house. I trust when you have your meeting that you will give some time to the consideration of this Act, and if you feel that in the public interests some amendments ought to be made, and that the roads of our country would be better maintained if certain changes were made, then if you would be kind enough to pass a resolution along such lines as you think best we will as a Government give the most careful consideration to your views, and as far as possible meet them. TEMPERANCE NOTES.

The growth of temperance sentiment, says the St John Times, is in no way more clearly illustrated than in the manner in which the public receives the information that a hotel proprietor in a Scott Act town has been sentenced to imprisonment. He may be a popular man, personally, but he has violated the law. Not many years ago no such violation would have been regarded by very many people as sufficient reason for placing a prominent citizen behind prison bars. Such an act, legal though it might be, would have aroused a general feeling of resentment. But the respect which people feel for law in general has come to be felt for laws which prohibit the sale of liquor; and so the man who violates it, whether he be bar-tender or proprietor, by that act forfeits the sympathy which formerly he might have claimed and enjoyed. It is not a pleasant thing to send a man to prison, but unless respect for law is paramount in a country the conditions must soon become intolerable. Therefore a community which has adopted the Scott Act should enforce it to the hilt, and regard all violators as persons who are opposed to law and order. If then the people do not want the law they have the power to bring about its repeal. No man enjoys seeing a neighbor taken to prison, but if the neighbor deliberately courts such a fate the responsibility rests upon himself. This is the present attitude of the people with regard to Scott Act enforcement.

The Times seems to hit the nail squarely on the head. There is a great temperance wave sweeping over the country. Before long it may be that the Scott Act will again be carried even in the city of St John, the stronghold of the liquor forces in our province.

The vote in the city of Toronto New Year's Day resulted in a sweeping temperance victory. Mayor Oliver was re-elected by nearly twenty thousand majority. Of the council, nearly three fourths are pledged to vote in favor of cutting off forty retail licenses. It is considered likely that every liquor shop in the residential portions of the city will be put out of business.
