"An Experiment."

The Moncton Times, a subservient Tory organ, which is ever ready to apologize for the short comings of the Hazen government, hastens to explain that the suspended highway act was "of an experimental nature, to get the views of the people."

This is certainly the most remarkable and refreshing piece of information yet suggested in connection with Mr Hazen's abject surrender.

An experiment indeed. Why the people of this province were told by Mr Hazen and his supporters that the new highway act was one of the best laws ever placed on the statute books of this or any other country. It was indeed the real thing, and under its operation New Brunswick roads would soon become perfect, so that the farmers could get to market with their produce in better time, and everybody would have reason to rejoice at the new order of things inaugurated through the wonderful wisdom of Premier Hazen.

An experiment indeed! When and where? The new law has not been brought into operation, because Mr Hazen has heard the protests of an indignant people. His road law, as well as his general blundering, has been passed upon in two constituencies, and in both Mr Hazen's candidates were defeated.

An experiment! Mr Hazen dared not bring his law into force in its present shape, and it is hung up for another year, while the much condemned highway act of his predecessors continues to govern road making in this province.

The Moncton Times adds that "the question is a difficult one to deal with and the government, fresh in power, did not feel competent to submit any act that would beyond doubt meet every reasonable objection even."

This is a remarkable confession after all the boasting the government made respecting the perfection of its new road law, which it has discovered is so vicious in principle and so loosely framed that Mr Hazen dare not bring it into operation until he has submitted it to the municipal councils.

There was no such proposition when the bill was before the legislature, and it is only second thought, after Mr Hazen has discovered the unpopularity and unworkable character of his boasted highway measure.—Herald.

Lawyers Quit Court Room.

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 5.—There were some rather interesting developments in the equity court this afternoon in connection with the case of Dennis McGalligan et al vs Hugh C Hunter and Wilfred T Hunter, are creditors of the defendants and are seeking to set aside a transfer of property from father to son, on the ground that it was fraudulent as against the creditors.

The discovery was made when the cases were taken up this morning that Hiram Schriver, of Peel, one of the plaintiffs, had died after the suit had been commenced. Dr Currey and J C Hartley, defendants' solicitors, claimed that on account of Schriver's death the case could not go on, and they asked for a postponement. They also stated that, knowing that the hearing could not be proceeded with, they had allowed their witness to return home.

F B Carvell and W P Jones, plaintiffs' solicitors, strongly opposed the application, and after hearing argument the court allowed them to amend the pleas by dropping Schriver's name, and decided that the hearing should proceed.

After the court had given its decision on the point raised and Mr Jones had started to read the pleadings in the case, both Messrs Currey and Hartley arose and without a word, left the courtroom.

After waiting a reasonable time, Crier Gill was sent to search for them and reported they had left the building. The chief justice seemed to be very much annoyed when this information was communicated to him, but said nothing. Mr Jones finished reading his pleadings and at the request of the court, read the answers thereto which he had placed in his hands some days ago by the defendants counsel. The court adjourned at 4.30 until tomorrow morning without calling witness, Mr Carvell said tonight that his side would go on with the hearing in the morning, even if the defendants counsel did not appear. No explanation in regard to the rather extraordinary action of Messrs Currey and Hartley is forthcoming.

Dr Currey returned to St John this evening, and it looks as if he has abandoned the case.—Telegraph.

The hearing in the above case was concluded Wednesday afternoon when the Judge made an order setting aside the conveyance of the property from hunter to his son, and ordered the same sold for the benefit of the creditors.
