Scott Act Inspector Dismissed.

Action of Town Council of Last Tuesday.

Petition Signed by Over One Hundred Ratepayers Demanding a Cleaning Up the Beer Saloons on Queen Street

The regular monthly meeting of the Town Council was held on Tuesday evening instead of Monday evening. Present Mayor Jones, Ald Fawcett, McManus, Fisher and Dugan.

Minutes of last meeting were read and approved. Treasurer Bourne reported showing a credit balance at the Bank of Montreal of \$8,997.17.

Referred to Finance Committee. There was a discussion over the failure of the town officials to report monthly.

Mayor Jones thought that the council should adjourn as a protest against the action of the officials, the Police Magistrate and license inspector in not reporting.

Ald Dugan moved that the council now adjourn until reports from such officials are received. Not seconded. The Mayor read a report from the license inspector stating that since last meeting he had a search warrant issued and placed in the hands of Chief Kelly, who seized two barrels of ale, owned by Simeon Jones, at the shop of Smith & Wright.

Mayor Jones—That is all very well but there was a motion passed that the license inspector should be present here at monthly meetings and present his accounts every month. Lindsay has not done so. We don't know how much he has spent. Last year there was a heavy bill presented at the end of the year for counsel fees. I will not stand for such actions this year. No business man can conduct his business the way some of the officials are conducting town business.

The clerk remarked that Mr. Lindsay had an important meeting to attend this evening, could not be present, and wished to be excused.

The matter was then dropped. Ald Fawcett—In the matter of the bill of the Connell Estate for 12 years use of ground at \$12 a year for mixing asphalt, I partly agreed to settle the bill at \$100. I am opposed to paying bills running so long, but probably this is the easiest way out of the difficulty.

Moved by Ald Fawcett, seconded by Ald McManus, that the bill be paid at \$100. Ald Dugan thought that there should be an order passed objecting to paying bills unless presented in a reasonable time. If the town is liable to pay the bill, then he would agree, but there was a doubt in his mind if the bill was a legal one.

The bill was referred back to Ald Fawcett for further examination.

On motion Ald McManus, seconded Ald Dugan, a resolution was passed changing a previous motion so as to conform with an order in council passed by the Local Government to enable J.D. Dickinson & Son to proceed with the erection of their tannery under the arrangement made with the council for the guarantee of bonds.

Supt. Fields verbally and in a written report dealt quite lengthily with the sewer system.

On motion Ald McManus, seconded Ald Fawcett, night watch McCarron was given two weeks holidays.

On motion Ald Fisher, seconded Ald Dugan, Driver John Bagley was given two weeks holidays, he to procure a suitable substitute.

On motion Ald Fisher, seconded, Ald McManus, the fire committee was instructed

to purchase 300 ft of hose.

Mayor Jones said that he had a petition signed by over 100 rate payers asking for the repeal of the beer license law. Our citizens are afraid to pass along one of the principal streets of the town owing to the disorder caused by drunkenness. It was said that if we took any action on the matter we would have to carry a revolver. He was willing to take definite action at any time. He had been informed that a prominent lawyer here claims that the beer license law could be repealed at once.

Chief Kelly got into serious trouble in one of those licensed places today. This thing must be stopped. The beer act is one of the most disgraceful acts that this council has ever passed. The town should take action tonight. Inspector Lindsay does not carry out the law. He does not even carry out the details. We asked him for a monthly report and he laughs at us. He is laughing at us to night.

Ald Fawcett—we cannot do anything about changing the law now. We have taken the money of these men and they have a license until June. We can dismiss the inspector and try some one else. I will be ashamed so long as I live that I had anything to do with licensing these shops. It has got to go on for a year.

Ald Dugan—I hold different views than do the Mayor and Ald Fawcett. Beer license act is a good act. It is one of the best ever passed by this council. It does not license them to sell lager beer. Merely to sell non-intoxicating beer. If you revoke the license everybody can sell soft drinks. You have it under control with the present law, while the inspector has power to enter these places at any hour of the day or night; if we revoke the licenses, no officer can enter these places before sunrise or after sundown. There has been a disposition on the part of a majority of the board to retain officers who will not do their duty.

Ald McManus thought that the law was a good one; it made a revenue and controlled the beer business. If the people wished to repeal the law when the licenses expired he would vote for repeal, but we will have the same men in the business without any control over them. The whole question was, is or is not the act being enforced?

Ald Dugan—The act is alright but we want a new inspector. We have no inspector now. Not a member of the board can defend him.

Ald Fawcett—I would like to ask the clerk if we can dismiss the inspector at any time.

Mr. Hartley—You certainly have a right to dismiss any of the town officials.

Moved Ald Dugan, seconded Ald Fawcett, that J. A. Lindsay, Scott Act Inspector, be dismissed. Carried Unanimously.

The appointment of a successor was left over until next meeting.

On motion Ald Fawcett, seconded Ald Dugan, it was decided to collect the 1908 taxes at once.

The finance committee was instructed to wait upon the treasurer and authorize him to issue the warrants.

Several bills were read and referred to finance committee.

Adjourned until Friday evening.

Cuba, Potatoes and Barrels

A Glance at One of Woodstock's Many Industries

Carleton and Victoria County Shippers of Potatoes and Apples Need Not Send Any Great Distance For the Barrels to Ship Their Produce In.

Even to the most uninitiated, it must appear, after a drive along the country roads of this county and Victoria as well, that potato culture is fast becoming a mighty factor in the commercial enterprises of this country.

Arroostook county, known all over America for the choice quality and quantity of its potatoes, will need to look to its laurels, for we, their neighbors, have after many years of inactivity, entered the lists in earnest for a share of the gold which has been pouring into their coffers for many years past.

Well need our shippers organize, for it will stand them in good stead to look up new markets to dispose of the bounteous crops which everything points to being harvested this year.

Much has already appeared in these columns of late concerning the Cuban market, notably since Dr. Kirkpatrick, the Canadian Trade Commissioner has invited attention to the new field for marketing potatoes in. Over on the other side of the province notably in Kent and Westmorland counties, they have been making large shipments of potatoes to the Cuban markets, and it is said on good authority that one firm alone is making preparations this fall to ship 50,000 bbls.

What prevents us from having a "look in" here?

Dr. Kirkpatrick informs us that all potatoes for the Cuban trade should go barreled and headed like apples.

Taking up the question of barrels, it led us to visit the works of the Maritime Coopers Company which is located in this town and has been doing business for the past three years, making pork, fish, molasses, apple and potato barrels.

Through the kindness of Capt. Bull, the manager, we were shown the different kinds of machines required for the manufacture and the stock required also the way in which the barrels are put together. The manager informs us that should the market warrant the outlay, it will be an easy matter to obtain skilled labor from outside, and as this is a well wooded

country, to make all the barrels needed as cheaply as any other place in the province, and at the same time develop an industry second to none in the country.

Several dealers who have had some experience with the Cuban trade have examined the apple barrels made by this firm and have expressed the opinion that they are just what are needed.

These barrels hold about 160 pounds and are made of spruce and bound with six birch or ash hoops.

The various machinery of this company is situated in the mill of the Smith Lumber Co, while the parts of the barrels, are assembled and the finished product turned out of the Coopers Company. Accommodation can be found for three or four times as many workmen as are employed at present.

The Provincial Secretary has undertaken to provide a frost proof warehouse in St. John for winter traffic, and a line of steamers will commence to ply between St. John and Havana the last part of this month. The Dominion Trade Commissioner has promised to do everything in his power to further the project, so it looks as though it is up to the dealers to try what is to us at any rate a new and untrodden market.

The suggestion has been made in St. John that our potatoes be sent there in bulk and barreled there. This seems almost like a reflection on the intelligence of our shippers, who in times past have been able to do their own grading and able also to command the very best prices in the cities of Montreal, Toronto and Boston.

It is said that "Charity begins at home" and if we have any dollars to distribute for sorting, grading and barreling potatoes let us keep them among ourselves.

Our dealers can stand right up behind what they know to be good Carleton County Potatoes.

It will certainly be a happy day for this county if we can add a part of the Cuban market to the places now available.
