New Trade Commissioner to Cuba.

Through the influence of Mr Carvell, Dr ES Kirkpatrick has been appointed by the Dominion Gov't, Trade Commissioner to Cuba, for the purpose of keeping the Government and Country posted generally on the trade conditions in that and adjoining islands and countries, and especially for the promotion of trade between New Brunswick and Cuba.

In July last a direct service was established between St John and Cuba and Mexico, by a number of St John gentlemen, and a monthly service has been run since, with good prospects of business. The New Brunswick members are pressing the Government to grant a subsidy of \$25,000 to enable the Company to grant as favorable freight rates as can be secured by competing lines, and have very strong reasons to hope they will be successful.

We are assured, on excellent authority, that last year nearly half a million barrels of potatoes were imported into Cuba alone, the greater portion from the United States, and with a direct line of steamers from St John there can be no reason why this trade should not be captured very largely by the County of Carleton.

Mr Carvell has the assurance of the Canadian Pacific Railway Co that in the event of a trade being worked up a reasonable export rate will be granted to St John, thus placing our farmers in the most favorable position possible to compete with all comers.

To show the importance of this business from our standpoint we have only to state that during the present winter the Steamers above referred to on one trip carried 8000 barrels of potatoes, purchased in Aroostook County, freighted by rail to Boston, brought back to St John by water and thence to Cuba. If these potatoes had been supplied direct from Carleton County they should have netted the farmer at least 75 cents per barrel more than the prevailing price.

There are also very large quantities of hay and oats imported into Cuba, practically all coming from Boston and New York, all of which could be furnished by New Brunswick shippers provided proper transportation facilities are provided and the conditions of the markets are properly made known to the producers here. The members are doing their best to provide the transportation, and it will be the duty of the new Trade Commissioner to furnish the necessary information as to markets &c, and we feel assured he will not fail in his part of the contract.

The Conservatives in their last Ditch.

Failing to clear themselves of the charge of having allowed the prisoner Armstrong to leave the gaol to vote for their candidate in the election of October last, the Conservative party now attempt to throw mud upon the honor and name of one of our foremost citizens. Every citizen of the Town knows James W Gallagher and a good many know "Angel" Armstrong. To clear themselves of the charge laid against them by Mr Upham they would make the citizens of the County at large believe that "Angel" Armstrong's word is to be taken in preference to that of ex-Alderman Gallagher.

It is a well known fact that "Trusty" Armstrong, as Sheriff Tompkins calls him, was committed to the gaol for stealing from Mr Gallagher in May 1908. His angelic disposition so impressed the Sheriff that he was not only given the liberty of the gaol and gaol yard but was allowed to go up and down the streets of the Town as he chose. It was because of this liberty and of the non-restriction that he was able to go across the river in a canoe and vote for his esteemed friend B Frank Smith.

The Conservative party may manufacture affidavits by the dozen but they will not alter the fact that "Angel" Armstrong went in and out of the gaol during the time that he was a prisoner practically as he chose. Nor will they alter the fact that he did vote, as it is generally believed, for the Conservative candidate in the election of last Oct; nor will these affidavits alter the fact that he was on the street until after midnight of the day of the election drunk and fighting and disturbing the Peace, and was taken to the gaol at about one O'clock by a prominent citizen.

TOWN OF WOODSTOCK, COUNTY OF CARLETON, TO-WIT:

I, James W Gallagher of the Town of Woodstock in the County of Carleton, Livery Stable Keeper, do solemnly declare as follows:—

1. That I have read over a copy of the declaration made by one Frederick Armstrong, purporting to have been declared to at the said Town of Woodstock, on the twenty-seventh day of March instant, before John McCormac, a Justice of the Peace in and for the said County of Carleton.

2. That I am the person who personally laid the information against the said Armstrong, upon which he was confined for six months in the Carleton County Gaol for stealing goods from my said livery stable.

3. That up to the fifteenth day of November last past I resided upon Maple Street in the said town of Woodstock, and the said gaol is also situated upon the said street, and I had to pass the same several times every day in going from my residence to my place of business.

4. That in passing said gaol I saw the prisoner Armstrong nearly every day, either in the gaol yard, or out on the front steps or in the streets smoking cigarettes and generally having a good time, and, as I was passing on nomination day the said Armstrong called me over to him and asked me how the election was going, and I told him I thought it was going to be a hard fight. He said "I would like to get out to vote election day" and I said "I would like to get you out Fred, can't you get the Sheriff to let you out."

5. I solemnly declare that I never spoke to Armstrong after that day, and did not know that he had left the gaol to vote until I heard, on the evening of election day, that he was on the streets drunk and fighting.

6. I further solemnly declare that John R Tompkins, Sheriff of the County of Carleton, was at the time of said election, a supporter and one of the most active workers for the Conservative candidate for the County of Carleton at that election, and that said Sheriff was at Peel in the said County all day on Monday the Twenty sixth day of October past, actively engaged in working and canvassing for the said Conservative candidate Mr B Frank Smith, and verily believe if he had been attending to his duties as gaoler of the said County the prisoner would not have escaped as he did.

7. I further solemnly declare that I did not in any way either directly or indirectly assist or in any way help the said prisoner to escape from the said gaol in order to vote at said election.

And I make this solemn declaration conscientiously, believing it to be true and knowing that it is of the same force and effect as if made under oath and by virtue of the Canada Evidence Act 1893.
