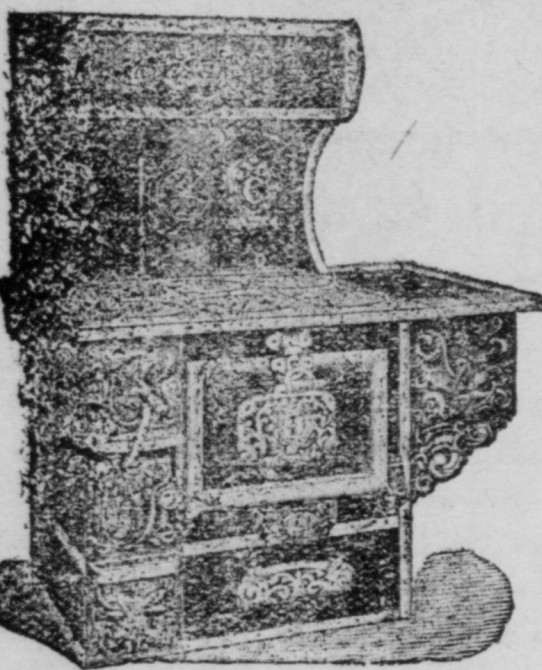

The New Crusade For The Children.

(Ottawa Journal.)

Two thousand and thirteen British children came to Canada the past fiscal year, the majority of whom were placed in situations or good homes; according to the report of J. Bogue Smart, chief inspector of British immigrant children and receiving homes. The report of the children immigration, which is part of the interior department report, shows some rather unexpected, but extremely interesting facts.

For instance, for every child that has been sent to Canada in the past eight years, there have been over seven applications from people wishing to adopt a child. In eight years 16,810 children have reached Canada from the British Isles, and in that time 115,408 applications for children have reached Mr. Smart's offices.

Children, before being sent to Canada, are put through a fairly severe probation, and a fair proportion of those willing to come are rejected, from the belief that they will not grow up to be self-supporting, or because they are temperamentally unfitted for Canadian life.

The children's progress in Canada is carefully watched until manhood. Very few of the children thus sent out ever figure in a criminal capacity. This is due to the careful probationary period on the other side of the water.

The work is carried on largely by philanthropic societies of Britain and no propaganda is conducted by the Canadian government to obtain these children. All, however, that present themselves naturally as candidates for Canada are given the usual probationary opportunity.

This work is annually saving the world a couple of thousand lives that will, in Canada, be valuable both to the country and to themselves. England, crowded, failed to give them the chance that Canada offers, and it speaks well for human nature that ninety-nine per cent of these children, although born and brought up in the unspeakable slums of London and other great cities, become men and women of whom their adopted country is proud.

Woodstock Man Struck by Train Dies of Injuries.

H. A. Amiraux, of Woodstock, N. B., died since 1877 a resident of Montana, died on Nov. 13 in St. Patrick's hospital, Missoula. His death was the direct result of injuries received when he was struck by a Northern Pacific passenger engine. Mr. Amiraux was then working on the outside of the track near Van Buren street, close enough to the rails to be struck. His life had been despaired of for more than 24 hours before death came.

He was born in Woodstock, N. B., on April 15 1832, and was 77 years of age, at the time of his death. In 1874 he moved to Oshkosh, Wis., and from that city he went to Missoula in 1877. At first he was employed as bookkeeper for the Higgins & Worden company and later, in 1882 he took charge of the inn at Baker station now Clinton. Four years afterward he took a ranch in the Blackfoot valley, near Potomac, and there he lived until 1900. Then he went back to Missoula to live at the home of his son-in-law, George Elliott.

Mr. Amiraux was married before he went to Montana. He is survived by his wife and the following children: Mrs. G. L. Elliott, Mrs. W. H. Smith and Mrs. Otis Worden, all of Missoula; Mrs. P. H. Mahoney of San Francisco, Henry A. Amiraux of Butte and George P. Amiraux of Washington.
