### Must Dissolve In Thirty Days.

St. Paul, Minn., Nov. 20.—In an opinion written by Judge Walter H. Sanborn, of St. Paul, and concurred in by Judges Vandeventer, Hook and Adams; with a special concurring opinion by Judge Hook, the United States circuit court for the eastern district of Missouri handed down a decision today declaring the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey an illegal combination operating in restraint of trade, and ordered its dissolution.

The opinion of the court was filed simultaneously in St. Louis and in St. Paul.

In this direction the government of the United States wins a sweeping victory and according to Frank B. Kellogg, of this city, who was the government's special prosecuting officer, the government has won every point for which it contended.

The case will be appealed direct to the United States Supreme Court, inasmuch as the judges who signed today's decree are in effect the judges of the United States circuit court of appeals, although they were sitting to try this case as the circuit court of the eastern district of Missouri.

### MUST BE DISSOLVED IN 30 DAYS.

The decree of the court dissolving the Standard Oil Company becomes effective in thirty days, when, no doubt, a stay will be granted an injunction will issue restraining the Standard Oil Company from a further continuance of its business under its present formation.

It appears from the concurring opinion written by Judge Hook that the company cannot do business under any other form with the object of stifling competition, for he says, on this subject, that it is thought that with the end of the combination the monopoly will naturally disappear; but should it not do so, and the members of the combination should not retire from it, except one who might perpetuate the monopoly by the aggregation of the physical properties and instrumentalities, it would constitute a violation of the decree of the court.

In the trial of the case the point was made that the Standard Oil Company was a beneficial corporation in that, by reason of economy in operation, it reduced the price of its product. This, Judge Hook says, can have no weight.

The suit terminated by a days decision was begun by the attorney-general of the United States in St. Louis Nov. 15 1906. Frank B. Kellogg, of St. Paul, was appointed special prosecutor, assisted by Charles B. Morrison, of Chicago; Frank H. Poole and J. H. Graves, of the department of justice, and W. H. Higgins, of Minneapolis, and Cordenio A. Severance, of St. Paul.

The Standard Oil Company presented a formidable array of legal talent led by John G. Milburn, of New York. Their defence was that the present organization of the Standard Oil Corporation was the result of natural growth of a great industry and no statute had been violated.

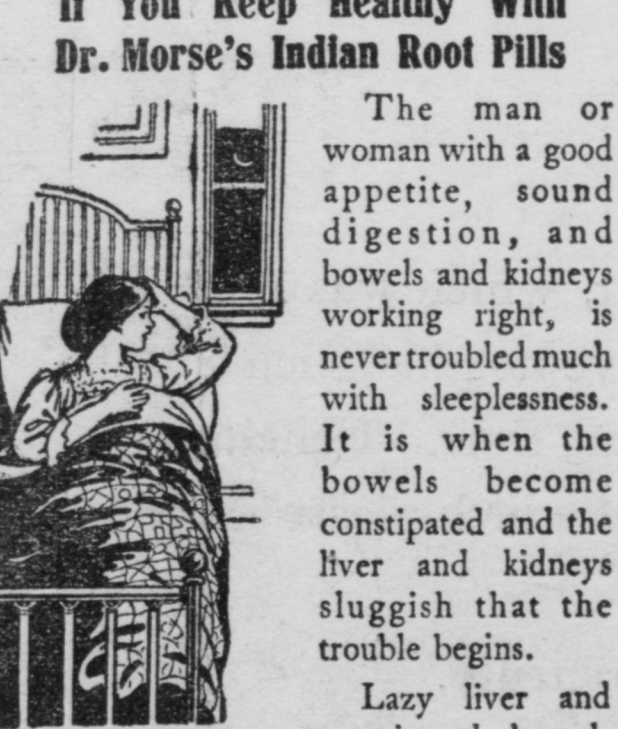

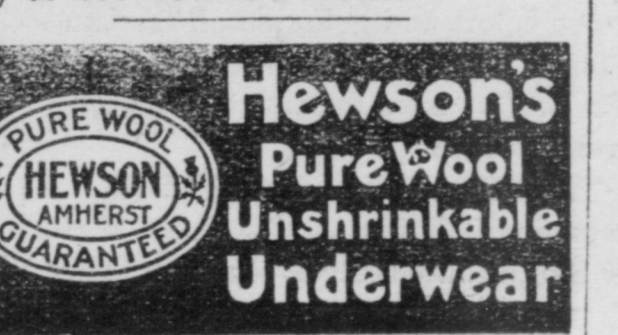

### New Anaesthetic A Revelation.

London, Nov. 19.—An operation performed today at the Seamen's Hospital, Greenwich, by Prof. Jonnesco, dean of the University of Bucharest, demonstrated a noteworthy development in the application of the wonderful anaesthetic, stovaine. Hitherto the drug has been confined to operations below the waist, its depressing influence upon the heart excluding its employment in operations involving the upper part of the body. Now, however, it has been discovered that this disadvantage can be overcome by employment of strychnine in combination with stovaine, and it was to demonstrate that this Prof. Jonnesco today, in the presence of some forty London surgeons operated to remove a mass of tubercular glands from a man's neck. He informed the surgeons that he used no general anaesthetic in any operation at the Bucharest hospital in eighteen months, having in that period performed more than seven hundred operations of various kinds and stovaine injections.

In the present case Prof. Jonnesco inserted a hypodermic needle into the spinal canal between two of the vertebrae at the base of the neck and injected three centigrammes of stovaine and five centigrammes of sulphate of strychnine dissolved in water. After a minute the patient was placed on the operating table and his head and shoulders were lowered so the numbing fluid could spread upward. Two minutes later the operation was carried out in the ordinary manner. No chloroform or other general anaesthetic was used. The patient was perfectly conscious throughout and said that he did not feel any pain and that he was quite comfortable.

There was something uncanny to the on-lookers to see the patient's unconcerned manner and hear him talk while there was a gaping wound in his neck three inches long. After the bandages had been fixed the man got off the table and walked to the next room where there was a stretcher waiting to take him to a ward.

### What Is Cream?

What is cream? The question is propounded by the chief analyst of the Dominion, Mr. McGill, in a bulletin, in which he gives the results of an examination of 64 samples of cream collected in various parts of the Dominion. The analysis showed that the people of Canada are buying as cream a milk product varying from 42 to 11 per cent of butter fat, and Mr. McGill submits that it is high time the question should be definitely answered and a standard for cream fixed by law. It would appear from an excerpt from the food report of the local government board that while they have no standard in Britain an official inspection of creameries shows that the Briton gets a cream that is at least 50 per cent butter fat. The United States standard is 18 per cent. This is the standard which Mr. McGill recommends. Thirteen of the 64 samples analyzed at the department are below that moderate degree of richness.

The chief analyst's researches into the Canadian cream supply has disclosed the unwelcome fact that leanness is not the only undesirable characteristic of this commodity. Adulterants are used and frauds practiced.

Mr. McGill suggests that no injustice will be done to the dealer and that a much needed protection will be afforded to the consumer, if the following definition of cream be made legal.

"1. Cream is that portion of milk, rich in milk fat, which rises to the surface of milk on standing, or is separated from it by centrifugal force; is fresh and clean, and contains not less than eighteen (18) per cent of milk fat.

"2. When guaranteed to contain a higher percentage of milk fat than eighteen (18) per cent, it must conform to such guarantee.

"3. Cream must be entirely free from gelatine, sucrose of lime, gums, or other substances added with a view to give density, consistency or apparent thickness to the article.

"4. Cream must contain no preservatives of any kind; nor any coloring matter, other than is natural in milk.

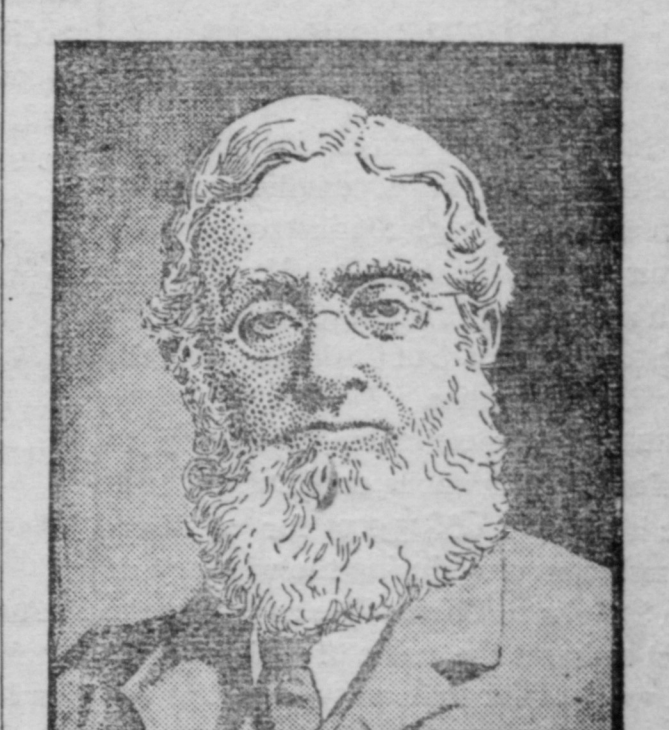
"5. Evaporated cream, clotted cream, condensed cream, or any other preparation purporting to be a cream (except ice cream), must conform to the definition of cream as given above, and must contain at least twenty-five (25) per cent of milk fat."
