A Greater Canada May Be Built up By Arctic Lands.

(Montreal Star.)

Most optimistic references as to the possibilities of the future development of Northern Canada were the features of the address delivered by Captain Bernier before the Canadian Club this afternoon. As a preliminary to this, the explorer urged the union of Canada and Newfoundland to secure for the work of the Dominion in the north experienced sailors, "the best in the world," as well as a great market for exchange, and the addition of Greenland, with its wealth of fisheries and game by exchange for some island in the Pacific, by the British Government.

Dean Walton presided and in introducing the speaker declared his belief that Bernier would have reached the pole if not limited by his instructions.

Captain Bernier spoke with a naturalness and a touch of humor that appealed strongly to his audience. He showed himself more of a speaker than one might expect from a man whose whole life has been spent in the work of the sea.

By his latest voyage he had annexed all the lands in the Arctic Archipelago, but there might yet be more to find further to the north and west which it might be worth while to seek.

Speaking of his ambition to reach the Pole, he made the trite remark: "It is very easy if you know how." But he went on to show that it was knowledge of the Arctic seas and the Arctic currents which was wanted. He was sure that with the Arctic he could reach the Pole. The Arctic was a slow ship but she was sure. With her on his last trip he had added 500,000 square miles to the Dominion of Canada. Peary and Cook had reached the Pole.

It is for these gentlemen from the United States to prove they were there," he said. "If they were there and left their records, they might be found by future discoverers, and or again they might have drifted away. If the tubes were water-tight then in two years or so they might be found on the coast of Greenland carried there by the tides or Arctic currents. Then the old story would be repeated. It

would be the word of one against that of another. But shall we go to see if they are there? It is for you to say, gentlemen. I would spend the last days of my life in work there."

"One of the first things to be done is to prepare. Get sailors. We have not got them, but Newfoundland has a population of whom 75 per cent. are sailors, and sailors the best in the world. We must first secure Newfoundland, bringing her into the Dominion (cheers). And with Newfoundland exchanging her fish for our flour we would control the fish trade of the world. Then Greenland by right belongs to North America. We should bring her in. Tell England we want Greenland, and she will negotiate with Denmark and give her an island in the Pacific. Greenland is too far from Denmark for her to get all the revenue possible. There are American fishermen in those waters. Soon it will be apparent that Greenland is necessary to us and now is the time to lay the foundations for the Greater Canada."

Make North Sea a British Lake.

London, Nov. 21.—With the beginning today of the establishment of a naval base at the Orkney Islands, the North Sea becomes practically a British Lake, which on the outbreak of war would be immediately closed to the rest of the world. The British admiralty has long contemplated the fortification of the Orkneys as a part of an elaborate scheme of naval defence.

The Orkneys, northernmost islands of the British archipelago, are the northern key of the North Sea. The southern key is Dover. At the latter point a fortified harbor, costing \$25,000,000 and large enough to accommodate the whole British fleet, has just been completed. The port is the most strongly fortified in England.

The actual base at the Orkneys will be Scapa Flow, which has a splendid harbor and is by nature almost impregnable. With these two points strongly fortified, and the great naval base at Rosyth on the east coast of Scotland, completed, England will have absolute control of the western division of the North Sea.
