U. S. and Canada Agree on Fishing Waters.

New York, Nov. 19.—According to announcement made in New York tonight, the agreement between the United States and Canada for the protection of the waters lying between the two countries from conditions endangering the fisheries, has been signed and will probably become operative within a fortnight.

The announcement was made by Dr. David Starr Jordan, the American member of the International Fisheries Commission, which has been engaged for more than a year in drawing up the statutes.

Dr. Jordan declined to make public the text of the agreement in advance of its promulgation by the President but he said that the terms would furnish adequate protection to fish life in the waters affected. The regulations, it is understood, will become law upon their promulgation by the President, without additional legislation.
