The Local Legislation has been dissolved and the McBride government is again appealing to the country on the same old "chestnut," their railway policy on which they went into power the last time they were elected. Their wonderful policy failed to build one mile of railway. This time they have gone a little farther and entered into a contract with Dan Mann to guarantee his bonds for \$35,000 a mile to build a road which will parallel the CPR through the Rocky mountains to the coast.

Two of McBride's ablest ministers, Hon R G Tatlow, minister of Finance and agriculture; and Hon F J Fulton, Chief Commissioner of Lands and works have resigned on account of his railway policy. Sir Charles H Tupper known throughout Canada as a strong conservative, as he will vote the whole Liberal ticket, and J F Garden one of the members for Vancouver says he will not run again. The condition of the contract as published in the papers is very vague. The premiere McBride said it was a complete contract. Billy Bowser, the Attorney General, speaking at another meeting said the contract was not yet completed. Which are we going to believe? There are thousands of acres of the best fertile land in this province practically vacant for want of transporting facilities. Railroads have been subsidised by the Dominion Government that could open up these places. If the Local government should co-operate with the Federal government on those lines it would make those places blossom as the rose; and would be something to their credit, but, no they fight shy of assisting anything the Dominion government is willing to do for this province. Mr Oliver says if his party is elected they would certainly assist those railroads that would tend to develop the agricultural sections of the provinces and other resources of the county. Mr Oliver is different from the ordinary politician. His word is as good as his bond. What the result of the poll will be on the 25th inst no man knoweth, but the prospect looks bright for the opposi-

tion. Mr J W Plummer Mr and Mrs Wm Everett and Mr L B Crowe arrived in Vancouver some time ago. The car containing Mr Everett's furniture, Mr Plummer's trotter and carriages came in all right. Some like that kind of weather, but it's here I think I shall stay, where the frost never bites, the sun never smites and snow banks don't get in my way.

Americans Executed.

Washington, Nov 18—Two Americans, Leonard Grace and Leroy Cannon, captured while serving with the revolutionist army in Nicaragua, have been sentenced to death by President Zelaya's orders and it is believed that the order been carried out.

The cruiser Vicksburg has been ordered to proceed in all haste to Corinto and gunboat Des Moines will proceed at once to Port Limon to observe events there and report the situation at that point by wireless.

The meeting between President Taft and new minister from Nicaragua, Isador Hara has been indefinitely postponed.

The news as to the two Americans reached the State Department last night from U S Consul at Managua and stated that their capture had been followed almost immediately by a death sentence. The Consul immediately appealed to President Zelaya to commute their sentence and his answer was "I will see." Later on, further he said that the sentence was final.

U S SHIPS SENT TO NICARAGUA.

A dispatch received this morning at State Department is to effect that the men have undoubtedly been executed. Upon this information orders were issued for the dispatch of the Vicksburg and the Des Moines.

The Des Moines is now at Colon, about 150 miles from Port Limon which she can reach within ten hours streaming under forced draughts. The Vicksburg is on the Pacific coast at San Jose de Guatemala, nearly 200 miles from the Nicaragua coast and will be able to reach Carinto at about the same time the Des Moines arrives at Port Limon.

The execution of the Americans is believed to have taken place at or near El Costillo, which is in the immediate vicinity of Greytown. The brutality of the Nicaraguan government in ordering the execution of these two Americans who happened to be found in the revolutionist army without trial of any sort, is likely to result in this government taking drastic measures to prevent a repetition of it and President Zelaya will be held to strict accountability for his action. President

Taft upon the receipt of this news was so incensed at the action of President Zelaya that he immediately announced that he would have no communication whatever with the new Nicaraguan minister and that official was promptly so informed.

At the Nicaraguan legation it was stated that no news of the execution of the two Americans had been received from the Zelaya government.

Harrisburg, Pa., Nov. 18—Leroy Cannon, believed to have been executed in Nicaragua, is the son of David K Cannon of this city and was last heard from by his father two months ago when he was in Guatemala. Mr Cannon thought his son was still in that country.

Washington Nov 18—The State Department knows nothing of the antecedents of Leonard Grace, who is reported to have been shot by order of President Zelaya, but the other American, Leroy Cannon, seems to have had an unusual career in Central America. His home is said to be in Pennsylvania, and he went to Central America and since, his name has figured prominently in revolutions in those countries. He has been arrested a number of times and tried for leading raids and on several occasions has narrowly escaped death sentences, it is alleged.
