

On the 8th of April in the Police
Court two convictions were made

liquor dealers, came up before the
Supreme Court at Fredericton on
Cortiorari this week. W P Jones K
O refused the appeals for the In-
spector and J B M Baxter K C of St
John for the defendants. These con-
victions were for shipping liquor in-
to Carleton County, and the points
involved have arisen under the con-
struction of the amendment made
last year to the Can Temp Act and
the decision of the Court will be
looked for with interest by all those
interested in the enforcement of the
law.

Cowan formerly of Upper Woodstock
fell from a building a distance of
thirty six feet bruising and cutting
his body quite badly. As yet the

in a very serious condition, but by
working over him for a few hours
they brought him to consciousness.

A delegation from St John waited
on the Local Government one day
last week to secure aid for a bridge
across the St John Harbour. The
bridge would span the harbour at
the upper end going from what is
commonly known as the Old Fort in
the West End to Navy Island and
from the Island to the foot of Port-
land St. It is proposed to erect a
double decked arrangement. On the
upper portion steam and trolley cars
will run and below for teams and
foot passengers. The Government
promised to give the project liberal
aid and the delegation will now go
to Ottawa and seek assistance from
the Federal government. It is un-
derstood that the proposed cost is in
the vicinity of \$750,000.
