The Valley Railroad.

Word came to the President of the Board of Trade, Mr J. T. A. Dibblee from Fredericton late Wednesday afternoon that Mr Hazen did not deem it desirable to guarantee the Bonds of the Valley Railroad any further than Centreville. A meeting of the Board of Trade is called for Thursday evening to discuss this matter. The general sentiment of all classes is that to accomplish the object for which the Valley Railroad is designed it must go to Grand Falls, we trust that a strong resolution will be passed at this meeting and that a delegation be appointed at once to lay the matter again before Mr Hazen. Aside from any political motive this journal feels that the future development of this town depends largely upon the securing of a competing Railroad. Until we have competition from some other trunk line we cannot hope to get the freight and passenger rates necessary to place Woodstock in a position to compete with other towns in the Province.

The Gibson Branch Service.

During the past week two letters worthy of attention have appeared in the Fredericton Gleaner. The object of the letters is to point out the need of improved passenger service on the Gibson Branch. The new C. P. R. superintendent, Mr Robt King, has caused the regular train to run as an express and put on a freight train to do the way freight work. But the running time of these called express now needs attention. Both letters point out that 14-12 miles an hour is slow business for this century. It would do much to cement the business relations of the two towns of the improvement begun by Mr King would go far enough to put a genuine express train between the two towns.

A New Masonic Hall.

Edward Loomer an aged and respected citizen of the County, passed away at the home of Mr Wesley Slipp, Bedell Sett., Saturday, 10th inst, aged 86 years and 3 mos. Mr Loomer was born in Nova Scotia and in early life moved to this County, settling at Jacksontown. In 1864 he moved to Jacksonville, where he lived till the death of his wife in 1905. Since that time he has lived most of the time with his daughter with whom he died. Mr Loomer married Elizabeth Brewer and is survived by four children, one son Lewis, of Washburn, Me and three daughters, Mrs Wesley Slipp of Bedell, Mrs Elisha Mallory, Attleboro, Mass and Mrs G A Mills of Boston, Mass. He is also survived by one brother, James Loomer of Woodstock. Mr Loomer was a respected citizen, a good neighbor and a christian. In politics he was a conservative and in religion an Adventist. Funeral services were conducted at the home where he died by Eld A H Kearney and interment at Jacksonville.

Field and Garden Seeds.
