**Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations.**

ANY person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands office or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties.—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

## SKETCH ON HON WM PUGSEY

Toronto Newspaper Man Says Minister is Both Shrewd and Capable.

OTTAWA, April 13.—The Hon William Pugsley is the man in the public eye, and just now the public is rubbing the eye. This makes things rather uncomfortable for Mr Pugsley, who naturally doesn't relish all the nasty things that his opponents are saying. Nobody enjoys being a target for sharpshooters, especially when the guns are loaded with bullets from the factory of a Royal Commission. Mr Pugsley, no exception, is looking rather worried, and the Conservatives at the House of Commons and elsewhere are looking correspondingly jubilant. They have been gunning for the Minister of Public Works for a long time, and now they think they have got him.

Mr Pugsley, however, is well able to take care of himself, as those who attacked him have found before now. His is a suave serenity against which the assaults of past sessions have beaten in vain. He is already pointing out that the commission has given no particulars to show what moneys are included in the large amount named. He will be found to be somewhat of a fighter. His face will never tell his enemies when they have hit home—if they do hit home. If they ruffle him in the logomachy which seems bound to mark the present week in the House, they will do rather more than they have in the past.

Mr Pugsley is somewhere on the far side of sixty; he modestly declines to put his age in the parliamentary companion. He was a college classmate of the Hon George E. Foster, however, and Mr Foster is sixty-two. They do not love each other.

"Bill" Pugsley, as his friends call him, is a stoutish gentleman with a twinkle in his eye, and a hitherto ineradicable smile. It is hard to think evil of the twinkle, which makes Mr Pugsley look almost the Santa Claus, but it is probably the habit of smiling genially at opponents which has made him at least one section of his enemies.

Converse with him, and he becomes a prince of entertainers, genial, sympathetic, full of good humor, a fine listener, measuring up the other fellow rather more than revealing himself. But there is no question about his being good company, in part, perhaps, because he listens so well.

While the Minister of Public Works is accustomed to present a front of pleasantry even to his foes, there are times in the House when he loses the merry twinkle and says things that hurt; things, however, which he appears to say in indignation rather than anger. If he gets "boiling mad," as he must sometimes, he does not show it by "boiling over."

In his own department Mr Pugsley is liked. His popularity with his subordinates is one of the things which the opposition cannot and do not deny. He tempers business with friendliness in a way which is popular with the civil servants.

For the rest, he is a clever lawyer, a consummate politician, and somewhat of a diplomat. He shakes hands with a deputation as cordially as though he owed them money. He has been in either provincial or Dominion politics since 1885, and has learned how to play the game with a cast iron smile that nobody can read.

Shrewd, capable, a gold medalist at college, and a taker of political "scholarships" since, Mr Pugsley answered his critics at the last election with a majority of 496. Whatever the present situation may finally bring forth, it is safe to predict that Mr Pugsley will be doing some effective fighting in the interval.

To dwell with Angels round the throne.

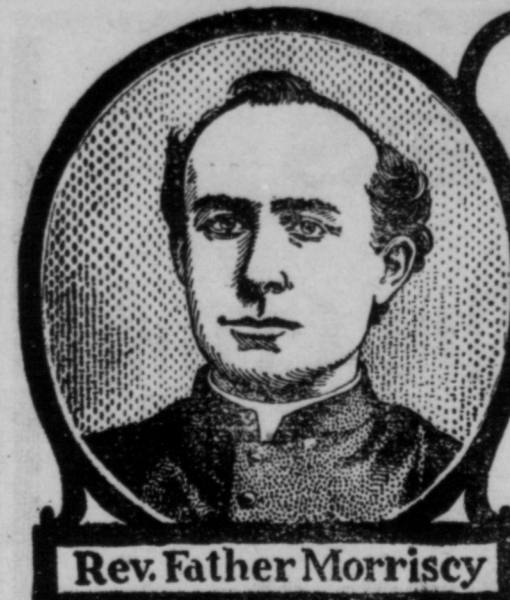
God in love our darling gave us,
