The Valley Railroad.

The rumor was current on Thurs-
day in Fredericton that the Carleton
county delegation which came to
the capital on Wednesday night to
urge Mr. Hazen to carry out his
pledge to introduce legislation pro-
viding for a bond guarantee for the
Valley railway were so thoroughly
disgusted with the action of Mr.
Hazen that they asked Mr. Flemming
to resign, and test the feeling of
Carleton county on this question.
Mr. Flemming had visions of last
November before him, however, and
he, if he was asked, declined to re-
sign. The action of Mr. Hazen with
relation to the Valley railway does
not inspire respect for Mr. Hazen as
a leader. A large section of the
county which Mr. Hazen himself ad-
mits ought to be provided with a
railway are again told they must
wait. When he was asked to deal
with this matter two years ago, A-
torney-General Pugsley, with as lit-
tle delay as possible, put an act on
the statute books authorizing the
province to guarantee the bonds of
the company it was thought would
construct the railway. Now when
the question presents itself in a new
form and Mr. Hazen is Attorney Gen-
eral he refuses to take any action
after admitting that he promised a
delegation that he would introduce
legislation before the close of the
session, setting forth the amount of
the guarantee he was prepared to
give and the conditions attached to it.

If Mr. Hazen is as sincere in his de-
sire to have this railway built as he
professes to be it would have been a
simple matter to have made good
his promise. His refusal to do so is
interpreted by the people of Car-
leton county to mean that for reasons
of his own he did not wish the rail-
way mileage of that county increas-
ed. It is also noticeable that Mr.
Flemming, who does not usually
hide his light under a bushel, has
been remarkably silent on the ques-
tion of the Valley railway since his
trip to Ottawa with the delegation.
If Mr. Hazen appears in a bad light
before the public on this question
his first lieutenant figures in an even
worse light. The province suffers
from the lack of courage of both
these gentlemen.—Telegraph.

Hon Mr Pugsley's Suit.

A suit in equity has been institut-
ed by Hon William Pugsley against
the directors of the New Brunswick
Coal and Railway Company and
other officials of that company who
were connected with it during the
time Mr Pugsley was an ex officio
director. It is understood that some
fifteen or twenty persons will be af-
fected by the suit. Mr William B.
Wallace, K. C. is acting for the Min-
ister of Public Works in this matter,
and informed the Standard that writs
had been issued on Tuesday. These
will go to the sheriffs in various
parts of the province and it will be
some time before the returns will be
made by those officials. A bill will
be filed for the accounting of the
various moneys handled in connec-
tion with the Central Railway. The
suit will be heard before the Chief
Justice of the province.

Mr Wallace says that, acting under
instructions from Dr Pugsley, on
next-day last he had a summons is-
sued against all the directors of the
company now living, against the re-
presentatives of deceased directors
and against all other parties concern-
ed.
