A large number of Masons went over to Houlton on Tuesday to attend a function given by the Masons of that town. They returned home on Wednesday morning.

George F Hartin, third son of the late Rev Thomas Hartin, of Canterbury station, but for several years a resident of Minneapolis was shot and instantly killed on the evening of Feb 7th.

Ned Raymond, son of Arthur Raymond, while engaged in basket ball practise on Tuesday at the gymnasium here, broke his collar bone, which will confine him to the house for a couple of weeks.

A basket ball match will be played on this evening in the hall on Albert street between the Florenceville consolidated school team and the High School team. A close and exciting game is looked for.

In the Equity Court in St John this week Thane M Jones presented the petition of Ewart Smith, Marshall Smith and Bertou Smith infant children, of the late James B. Smith of Carleton County, to have their interest sold in certain lands. This was granted under certain conditions.

Colin M King, traveller for the Baird Co who had been sick at his home in Lakeville, was taken to Montreal a few weeks ago, where an operation was performed, and we are glad to state that Mr King is now on the road to recovery and expects to be home shortly.

O E Tanner was defeated in the local by-election Tuesday last in Pictou county by a majority of about 150. The Liberal candidate was R H McKay, or Westville. Tanner is the Conservative organizer in Nova Scotia and resigned his seat in the local house to run in the federal elections, where he was defeated. He was also leader of the opposition in the legislature.

A special telegram to the St John Evening Times says: Mr and Mrs Frank Carvell are very anxious concerning the illness of their daughter Mildred, who came with them from Woodstock last month, to attend the Ottawa Ladies College. It is thought now that she was attacked by the typhoid germ before she left home. For nearly two weeks she has been in a private ward in St Luke's hospital, and yesterday her symptoms were of so grave a character that a well known specialist, Dr Lafleur, of Montreal, was called in consultation with Drs Argue and McAlister. Mr Carvell's sister, who has been a graduate nurse for some time in Boston, has been telegraphed for.

At the annual meeting of the S P C A in St John on Tuesday last—Mr Colpitts, of Woodstock, made an interesting address, with special reference to the care of horses. He called attention to the importance of this animal, and hoped that the government would take up the matter of care of it, so that instruction might be given. He specially referred to the proper shoeing of horses, to which sufficient attention was not given, and he graphically related facts which had come under his notice respecting suffering by horses by not having their mouths looked after. The horseowners present were greatly interested in Mr Colpitts' practical remarks. The president heartily thanked him, and said that if he would come to St John at a future meeting and deliver such a practical address they would undertake to get him a large audience.

Dominion Parliament.

There was a discussion in committee of the bill of Mr Aylesworth to penalize the payment of secret commissions or their acceptance. There was a question raised as to whether there should not be a limitation in the jurisdiction of justices and magistrates in trying such cases and whether the wording of the British act should be adhered to, specifying that the commission must be offered and accepted with corrupt intent.

On this point Mr Aylesworth said that the British act had been framed after a thorough discussion of this point. It was not desirable that the making of simple gifts of a minor nature should be held criminal. Such gifts might be made without corrupt intent or desire to influence a transaction. It should be left to the opinion of the courts as to whether gifts were offered and accepted for the purpose of improperly influencing business transactions.

Mr Carvell, of Carleton, thought it would be unwise to allow justices of the peace to try cases under the act. If they were allowed to try such cases he thought it would be found that political considerations and personal prejudice would be found to work in many cases to the disadvantage of the accused. He thought that persons accused of offences, under the act, should have the right of election as to the court in which they should be tried.

On this point the minister of justice said that he saw no reason for departing from the regular practice followed under the criminal code but he promised to take the suggestions of Mr Carvell into consideration and for that purpose moved the adjournment of the discussion of the bill.

The resolution providing for the increase of salaries of civil servants was adopted and the house went into supply on the Indian votes.

(1) By increasing the bonding powers of the Company to \$5,000 per mile;
