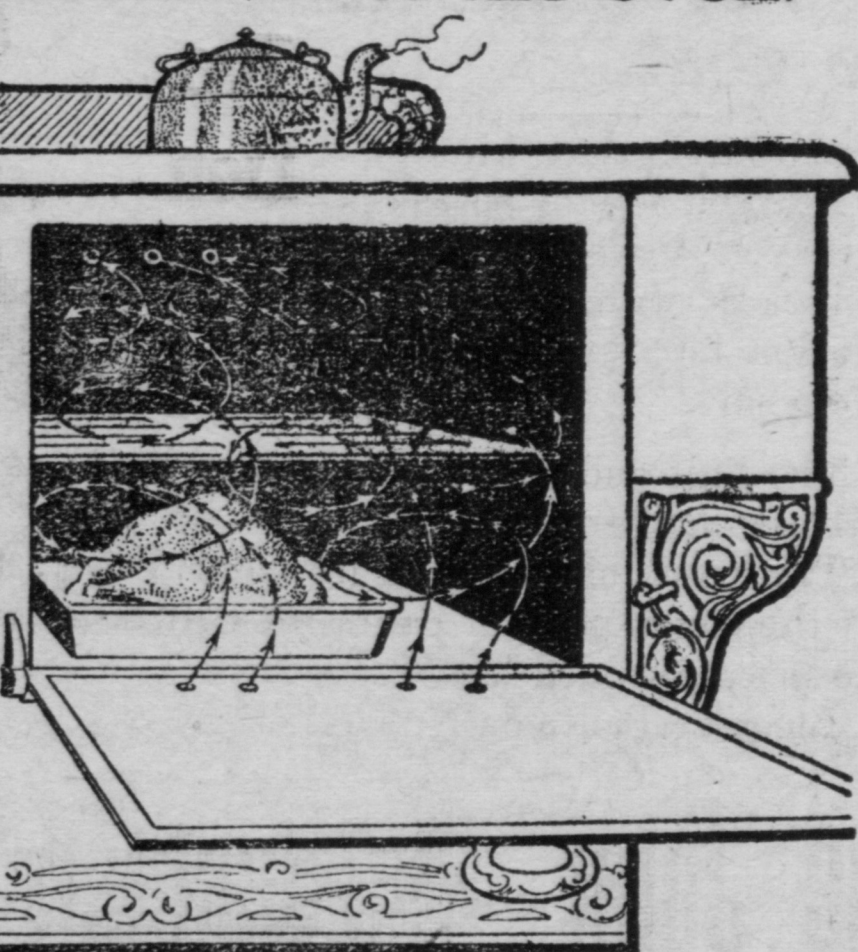


Kootenay Steel Range
