The Muttons Crew.

(The Morning Chronicle.)

It is idle for the organs of the Opposition to deny that there is serious dissension in the party camp over the navy question, or that there are rumblings of revolt, against Mr Borden's leadership. The "party hacks" are doing their best to cover it up, but there are Conservative papers which are not afraid to tell the truth. Nobody will venture to question the Toryism of the Hamilton Spectator. And this is what it has to say:

"With Monk, of Quebec, talking like a leader and contrary to the announced policy of the Conservative Party, and men more or less prominent in other parts of the country making a noise like opposition to recognized authority in the party ranks, it is more and more plainly evident that there is need for a national party convention to let the rank and file express itself, and set the leaders, real and would-be, right on several important points of policy."

Then, there is that ardent lover of Toryism of the old school, the Toronto Telegram, the organ of Mr John Ross Robertson, ex-M.P. The Telegram comes out openly for the deposition of Mr Borden. Here is its editorial utterance:

"If R L Borden, M.P., submits his resignation to an Ottawa caucus of his followers, the latter, to employ the chaste and eloquent terms never found in the London Times, should grab it quick."

"The question, 'what would the Opposition do for a leader?' is answered by this other question—

"Has not the Ottawa Opposition been doing as badly as it could do under any conceivable circumstances?"

"Could the Opposition make more mistakes or miss more opportunities without R L Borden than the Opposition has made and missed with R L Borden?"

There is also a still higher authority, the Toronto World, which voices the opinions of its editor, Mr W F Maclean, M.P. The world, generally, is well posted on what is going on inside, and its version of the mutiny in the ranks may be taken as authoritative. On the eve of the opening of Parliament this Conservative journal printed the following:

"Ottawa, Nov 8—(Special).—The Conservative caucus called for Friday, in Ottawa, will be a notable event. There is expectation of a discussion over the leadership of the party. A section of the Opposition, while entertaining the utmost loyalty towards R L Borden, personally, are convinced that he will never lead them to victory at the polls, lacking, they say, the power of strong leadership. They base their claim on one or two incidents in the House, when he failed to fasten upon the weakness of the Government and make his party the mouthpiece of public opinion. Particularly was this the case, they say, during the debate on the resolution on Imperial naval defence. However, it is stated here tonight that Mr Borden will take first action, and will tender his resignation as leader of the party at the caucus on Friday. Whether it will be accepted or not, is, of course, impossible to say. In such a case Premier McBride of British Columbia is believed to be next in order. There are many who affirm that he will be in Ottawa leading the Opposition before Christmas is here, but in view of the fact that his Government will hardly have them passed through a general election, and with an elaborate railway policy to carry out, this is hardly probable."

Then, of course, there are Premier Roblin, and Hon. Robert Rogers and the group of Western Tory members, who have openly flouted Mr Borden's declared policy, not to speak of Mr Monk, M.P., his Quebec lieutenant, who has, taken the strongest possible grounds against the

policy to which Mr Borden has solemnly and unreservedly committed his party. Most people would be disposed to accept the statements of these ardent supporters and candid friends of the Tory Party as evidencing that the insurgents are numerous and aggressive. For our part, we do not anticipate that Mr Borden will immediately throw up the job. The salary attached to it is a very handsome one, and Mr Borden has shown remarkable complacency in the past in tolerating humiliation and indignities at the hands of his nominal followers. Still he would be a bold man who would venture to prophesy what the upshot would be. The growing "boom" for Premier McBride looks ominous for Mr Borden.

No Votes, No Glory.

Mr Monk's speech has aroused the anti-Quebec Toronto Telegram to fresh fury. It accuses Mr Monk the distinction of being "the real leader" of the Conservative Party, saying:

"French-speaking Conservatism in Quebec manifestations has posed as being less British than Laurier and far more Clerical."

"Ontario Conservatives should read the speech of F D Monk, M.P. That speech declares for a policy of cold and selfish isolation from the life or death of the British Empire."

"The speaker, Mr Monk, is not merely a leader of the Conservative party. He has been THE LEADER of the Borden Opposition and the director of its tactics."

"Was it not to please Mr Monk that the party fell down on the school question in 1905? Was it not to please Mr Monk that the party wobbled itself into the vacuity of the Laurier-Borden resolution of 1909?"

"How many more sacrifices must the English-speaking Conservatives of Canada make, how many more ideals must they abandon in order to retain their fellowship with F D Monk, M.P. and what has that fellowship been worth either in votes or glory to the Conservative Party of Canada?"

This is terrible. No votes, no glory! The only thing left for "patriots" such as the Telegram is to throw Mr Monk overboard, and move the whole Tory outfit to Toronto. What's the use of permitting anybody in Quebec to have a word to say about the affairs of the Dominion? The divine right to rule belongs to bigots of the Telegram stamp.

Sir Hibbert's Bolt.

The Vancouver Province, Conservative, to hand, bears out the telegraphic report of Sir Hibbert Tupper's "bolt" in British Columbia. In an interview in the Province on November 4th, he characterized the railway policy of the Tory Government as "wild and unconsidered." The interview in the Province continues:

"It is rumored, Sir Charles, that you may take the platform in opposition to the Government; is there any truth in that?"

"That is a matter I have not considered," replied Sir Charles with hesitation.

"It is my intention, however, to vote Liberal, he continued, after a momentary pause, "and I shall vote the whole Liberal ticket."

Sir Hibbert has now burned his bridges behind him, and, according to a Victoria despatch to the Montreal Gazette, is starting on a campaign tour in opposition to the McBride Government. If anybody had prophesied a year ago that the son of Sir Charles Tupper would take the stump against the candidates of the Tory Party, he would have been laughed out of court. But the improbable has happened. Sir Hibbert has "bolted" in earnest.

Town Council.

A special meeting of the town council was held on Monday evening.

The proceedings of the last meeting were ratified by the town council.

His Worship said that this meeting had been called to conclude a settlement with Murdoch for making a survey of the streets of the town. He asked the clerk to explain the contract.

Mr Hartley said he had not looked into the matter, but it was his opinion that Mr Murdoch was to have a certain price per day for actual work. He did not know whether this included the making of the plans.

The matter was laid over until further information can be obtained.

Supt. Fields was heard in regard to the matter of plumbers tapping the water and sewer service of the town without first obtaining a permit. Last week the sewer and water service of the Houlton Road had been tapped without a permit by a plumber and he had not reported the matter. A hole had been dug on Elm street by the same plumber without a permit, and on account of proper precautions not being taken as to lights at night, a horse had fallen into the hole was badly injured.

He thought there were many cases where the pipes were tapped unlawfully and unless the council took steps to remedy the matter, it hampered him in his work.

Coun McManus thought there was a bye-law governing the matter and the Supt should have the power to enforce it, as there was a penalty for the offence.

Coun Dugan said he did not think the council should pass a motion every time a law was broken. The law on this matter was clear and if one of these violators was punished it would remedy this state of things in future. He believed there were between \$5,000 and \$6,000 worth of water used, caused by the violation of this bye-law, that the town received nothing for it.

His Worship thought it would be better to notify the plumbers with regard to unlawfully tapping the town services, and then if they did not go according to the law, to make an example of them.

Coun Hagerman said he was glad to see the council taking up the matter. He had been chairman of the water committee for the past three years, and it was his hobby to get this matter straightened out. He had tried to have a census taken of the water takers of the town, but this had been taken out of his hands. He believed the town was not getting paid for much more than half the water that was being used for domestic and other purposes. If this state of things goes on the town will lose its water system. He moved a resolution that the Supt be instructed to notify the plumbers not to break ground, or make any connection with the water or sewer service without first getting a permit from the town.

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made a hobby of the C.P.R. water rates. A committee who is shortly going to Fredericton will make application to the Provincial Government to have permanent approaches laid down at the entrance to the river bridge.

The matter of making Main street a permanent highway will come up for discussion later.

PUREBRED HORSES FOR NEW BRUNSWICK.

At the request of the Provincial Department of Agriculture, Wm McManey of Russell, Ont., one of the leading Canadian Clydesdale importers, has arranged to bring sixty-five purebred Clyde mares and three stallions to St John. They will leave Glasgow on the Donaldson liner "Vassandra" on the 20th inst, should reach St John between 1st and 4th December, and will be offered at Public Auction there on Tuesday, 14th December. Arrangements have been made with the Railways by the Department of Agriculture for return tickets to St John at single first-class fare upon the Standard Certificate plan, and the Department will pay the freight from St John to the purchaser's station upon all animals bought within New Brunswick.
