The people of the St John Valley from Grand Falls to St John asked Premier Hazen for substantial assistance toward this much needed work and he gave them a few nice phrases and asked them John. to call at a more convenient season. What the people want is a road right down the river to St John and we are looking to Mr Hazen to say whether or not he is willing to assist

It is now up to Mr Hazen. It may be a little humiliating to adopt a policy which he opposed while in opposition but as he was always wrong then it won't hurt him to get right now.


