This is April 24th, 1909. We are  
having growing weather now. Irish  
potatoes are in bloom. The natives  
are eating green peas, lettuce, straw-  
berries, peaches are large as robin  
eggs. Farmers are most through  
planting and corn is coming up, we  
hope to have a good crop year. I see  
you have lost nature's bridge over the  
St. John river, this will suit the  
lumbermen I presume. I see a writer  
in your paper by the name of Green,  
has found the eden of earth in B. C.  
When I was a boy I have heard my  
father talk of a man he knew that  
went by the name of Herring Green.  
This man I W. A. S. Green may be a  
descendant of his. It is very natural  
for good or bad habit to be handed  
down to posterity. I think brother  
Green it was naughty for you to  
write such a letter to a preacher, he  
may have you up in church for using  
unbecomingly language. Mr. Editor  
I am glad you prefaced that letter  
as you did, by not being responsible  
for statements made by correspond-  
ents. It sets you up all right. But,  
alas, poor Green, my my what straw-  
berries that man claim to raise,  
twelve inches in diameter, well I bet  
that man Green is a clever fellow.  
I just received an other bundle of  
papers and a magazine from my  
friends at Buttermilk Creek, many  
thanks, I am often asked what do  
people do up there in the winter for  
amusement and past-time, now I can  
show them that magazine full of  
beautiful illustrations, and by the  
way I can show them some fine look-  
ing men and women too. Well my  
wife has gone on a visit for a week  
or ten days, and has left me to care  
for her numerous fowls, one hundred  
little chicks and thirty-five older  
ones, these little ones are to be fed  
three times a day with certain kind  
of feed, and the older ones once a  
day with an other kind of food. Some  
of the hens are laying very nicely,  
some are setting and others want to  
but I have not decided whether I  
will give in to them or not, but I  
recon I will have to yield, they are  
so much like some women, what  
they take a notion to do, you may as  
well clear the track and take off  
brakes, so you see with all these lit-  
tle details to look after, (and I have  
not mentioned near all) I am a very  
busy man, but I live in hopes of re-  
lief after a week or so.

I received two beautiful picture  
cards of the town of Woodstock and  
the spot pointed out where the new  
court house is to be. It is a pretty  
location and I hope Woodstock and  
county will do it big. There seems  
to be much said and written about  
foreign emigration to your province,  
from any boyhood I have been op-  
posed to foreign emigration yet I  
admit a great many imports make  
the best of citizens but a great many  
more are worse than nothing. I ven-  
ture the assertion that you cannot  
import anything that will improve  
on home production, young men of  
your own raising and acclimated and  
trained to your laws and customs  
and are ready to take to themselves  
a blue nose girl and settle down and  
build a home for themselves and  
make a class of good citizens. But  
they are in many cases not able  
financially to purchase a home,  
neither can they secure permanent  
employment at remunerative prices  
long enough to collect a sufficiency  
to purchase a new or improved  
place, hence they migrate in pursuit  
of better openings and you lose  
your young men and many of the  
young ladies go also. Now it seems  
to me a better plan would be some-  
thing like this. Let the government  
put down the amount she is willing  
to invest in foreign emigrants and  
multiply that by two and set this  
amount aside, or invest it in such a  
way that it could be drawn upon  
from time to time as needed. Now  
fix as a premium for every young  
man of your own province, who will  
settle on your wild or purchase if he  
prefers, an improved home, a liberal  
amount of that fund to give him a  
start in life, of course this should  
only apply to worthy men, that  
would take this as a nucleus to build  
on. This fund would be looked  
after by Executive committee and  
this same committee should investi-  
gate the character and worthiness of  
each applicant. The foregoing is  
an outline for wiser heads than mine  
to put in proper shape but keep your  
boys at home if possible, similar  
conditions as the foregoing forced  
me from a home I loved so dearly  
and still love. Out of seven brothers  
in my father's family five of us  
migrated to the state, there being  
small inducements to cling to native  
soil.

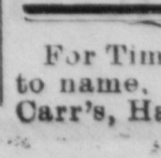
