HAZEN AND FLEMING
WEIGHED IN THE BAL-
ANCE AND FOUND
WANTING.

The Valley Railway Buried.

The expected has happened. Premier Hazen and Mr Fleming, notwithstanding the necessity for early action, and notwithstanding the brilliant prospects of success but because of this condition of affairs, have deliberately gone back on all their professions and have, for years, defeated this much needed work, on the ground that "it would be unwise just at the close of the Session to rush through such important legislation" and on the pretext that during the coming summer "he would consult the Federal Authorities and see if some arrangement could not be completed" &c.

For the first time probably in the history of this Railway proposition, both political parties were earnestly allied for the single purpose of securing the road, and, as the Federal Authorities had already granted a subsidy, of \$6400 per mile, the people approached Mr Hazen not for a subsidy, which meant cash paid out and an actual and permanent increase in the Public debt, but a BOND GUARANTEE, which in the event of the enterprise proving a success (and who doubts but that it would) would not add a single dollar to the debt of the Province.

A delegation representing the whole Valley of the St John waited upon the Premier before the Legislature met and even then he commenced his shilly-shally tactics by asking them to go to Ottawa and see what assistance could be obtained there. Fortunately Mr J T A Dibble, the President of the Board of Trade in Woodstock, got an intimation of this and wired our Federal Member, and when they met the Government the next day, Mr Dibble was armed with a long telegram from Mr Carvell, setting forth in detail the particulars of the subsidies and showing Mr Hazen that there is now alive and available a double subsidy for every mile of the territory from Grand Falls to St John, part of which was voted in 1907 and the balance in 1908.

When confronted with this information Mr Hazen was dumbfounded and asked for time in which to consider. After a couple of weeks the delegation again approached him and he again tried to shift the responsibility to Ottawa and asked them to go there and ask the Federal Government to agree to run the road as a part of the Intercolonial Railway, never dreaming for a moment that they would consent.

The delegates did as he suggested, and his chief partner in the crime against our interests, Mr Fleming, followed them on the same train in the private car of Sir William Van Horn, but took precious good care not to mingle or in any way associate with the delegates until after he arrived in Montreal, and then, for the first time, the real cause of the perjury of Hazen and Fleming commenced to dawn on the delegates regardless of political affiliation.

So strong was the language used by the Conservative delegates to Mr Fleming that, for the moment, he surrendered and appeared before the Government with the delegation, and said not a word which would in

any way convey to the Government his opposition to the whole scheme to Grand Falls, but on the contrary, joined with the delegates in their request.

Something must have happened on his way home because the next week the Premier announced in the House his opposition to the scheme.

It is not our intention to relate in detail what happened the next week when a delegation of upwards of forty of the leaders of the Conservative Party in this County, together with a few Liberals again went to Fredericton. Suffice it to say that they were in real earnest and were not playing for political support but wanted the road and did not hesitate to tell the Government what they wanted. It is stated that when Kidd sneaked out of the Council Chamber they pulled him back, and even went so far afterwards as to demand his resignation, yet, notwithstanding all these actions they failed.

We wish again to point out to our readers that the people of the Valley, went to the Local Government for assistance, and the Local Government has persistently been trying to get rid of them by sending them to Ottawa and trying, if possible, to lay the blame of failure where it does not belong.

On Thursday of last week the Federal Government, through Mr Carvell, advised Mr Hazen to take to himself power to guarantee the bonds, subject however to the condition that he would not have to act on it unless they made satisfactory arrangements to operate the road with on completed. Surely nothing could have been fairer. If the Dominion Government would not make arrangements satisfactory to Mr Hazen and his Government, he would not have to guarantee the Bonds, and the blame would rest on the Dominion Government, and yet on the face of as fair an offer as this they refuse AND WHY?

Surely not because the road is not needed, not because their political friends were not heartily supporting the scheme, not because they could not make political capital out of it, and not because, if they accepted the above proposition they could not make political capital against the Liberal party if the Dominion Government refused to make a reasonable agreement to operate the road.

Even admitting that Mr Hazen is honest when he says he will try to come to an agreement with the Dominion Government within the coming year, the work is delayed a year and we have no hesitation in saying it is by their action buried for years to come.

Again we ask THE REASON WHY, and in reply can only say that there must be some connection between their duplicity on the part of Hazen and Fleming and that midnight ride to Montreal in Van Horn's private car.

It is freely stated that the Conservatives of Carleton County intend demanding Fleming's resignation. That is their business not ours, but we can tell him without much difficulty, what will happen to him when next the Electors of Carleton Co get a chance at him. We have been saving his Blue Bell transaction for use further on, but it will not be necessary now.

And in conclusion, where does Mr Munro stand? In what manner has he endeavored to assist this enterprise? It will be interesting to hear from him. It is only fair however to say that, so far, we have no evidence that he has actually been in league in any way with the chief conspirators, his principal sin seems to consist in loyalty to the men who have so ruthlessly sold our rights for a mess of pottage be the same great or small, but even this is a sin of sufficient magnitude to demand an explanation.

Appeal Case.

In the Supreme Court at Fredericton last week judgment was delivered in the case of the Executors of the last Will and Testament of L P Fisher against Frank R Shaw. The action was on a promissory note which the plaintiffs alleged Shaw had endorsed for the Woodstock Carriage Company. It was tried in the Carleton County Court in July last with a jury who found a verdict for Mr Shaw. A new trial was granted by the Judge of the County Court on several grounds and Mr Shaw appealed to the Supreme Court.
